Outlook Tip

Setting Outlook to allow commas as an address separator

By default Outlook does not allow commas to be used as address separators. Outlook is configured this way because many organizations use the comma in their naming scheme in the directory - "Lastname, Firstname". So if commas as address separators were enabled by default, Outlook would interpret someone typing in "Smith, John" as two separate addresses, and would try to resolve "Smith" and "John" separately. There are instances, however, when you need Outlook to accept the commas as address separators - like if you use Banner's class list email function. Fortunately Outlook provides a way to do this.

In Outlook 2010:

- 1. Click on the **File** tab and select **Options**
- In the Outlook Options dialog box click on Mail in the left column
- In the right hand pane scroll down to the Send Messages section
- 4. Check the Commas can be used to separate multiple message recipients box.
- 5. Click the **OK** button on the lower right.

In Outlook 2003/2007:

- 1. Click on **Tools** then select **Options**
- From the Options dialog window, click E-Mail Options on the Preferences tab
- In the Email Options window, click the Advanced Email Options button
- 4. In the Advanced Email Options dialog box, check the Allow comma as address separator box
- 5. Click **OK** three times
