Doors and the Backstage Lounge open at 7:30 p.m. with show time at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$15 for adults, \$10 for students and seniors, and free for MSUN students with a valid .ID. 

Faculty, administrators, and staff, did you know that you can access the online version of the Chronicle of Higher Education from on and off campus? The Vande Bogart Library maintains a subscription to the online Chronicle of Higher Education. When you are on-campus, go to the library's "Index and Database Descriptions" page (<a href="http://www.msun.edu/infotech/library/DbDescript.htm">http://www.msun.edu/infotech/library/DbDescript.htm</a>) and scroll down to the link for the Chronicle. Another way to access the Chronicle on-campus is to simply type <a href="http://chronicle.com">http://chronicle.com</a>. When you want to read the Chronicle from off-campus, use the link from the library's web page listed above and when you get the "Library Proxy Service Login" box, use your NetID or Banner ID username and password to login. You can find a copy of the current issue or archives in the "News" section of the Chronicle website. Reading the Chronicle is one of the best ways to stay informed as to what is happening in the world of higher education.

Next week, due to the Election Day holiday (November 6), the library's hours will change for the week. #### Word 2010 Tip

### A quick Word trick for typing text into a scanned document

Paper forms aren't obsolete, not by any means. But if you want to use Word to fill them in, you can. Using a scanned document isn't a perfect solution, but it'll work in a pinch.

First, scan the form and save it as a graphics file. You're on your own with that step as systems are unique in their instructions. Be sure to save the scanned form in a format that Word can use, such as jpg, png, or bmp.

Once you have the scanned document file, insert it as a picture:

- 1. In a blank document, open the header section (just double-click in the top margin area)
- 2. With the header section open, click the **Insert** tab. Then, click **Picture** in the **Illustrations** group.
- 3. Once the picture is selected: on the **Format** tab choose **Behind Text** from the **Text Wrap** dropdown in the **Arrange** group.
- 4. Close the header section by double clicking in the body of the document (don't worry if the graphic dims a bit).

With the graphic in the background, you can now type as you normally would, using the graphic as your guideline. There are no special controls or tabs to position the cursor for you. You can certainly go that route, but that takes a lot of work, and unless you're going to reuse the form a lot, it's probably not worth the effort.

Most likely, the form won't align just right the first time you try. Simply open the header and adjust the position of the form as needed. You can also change the font, font size, and tab stops to accommodate the form's fill-in positions.
