#### **Northern Honors its Veterans**



While Northern was closed on Tuesday for Veterans Day, the Northern family gathered together in the entryway of Cowan Hall on Wednesday over lunch to honor Northern's veterans. Northern's Provost, Dr. William Rugg said, "Our debt to these heroes can never be re-paid, but our gratitude and respect must last forever. For many veterans, our nation was important enough to endure long separations from their families, miss the births of their children, freeze in sub-zero temperatures, bake in wild jungles, lose limbs, and, far too often, lose their lives." Rugg continued to say, "Can any CEO or distinguished Ivy League graduate truly claim to have more responsibility than the 21-year-old squad leader walking point on patrol in Afghanistan?"

Following his speech there was a moment of silence. Debra Bradley presented a U.S. flag as a gift to the campus. The flag was flown in front of our nation's capital in Washington D.C. John Donaldson, the senior veteran among those present, accepted the flag on behalf of Northern's veterans. This flag will reside in the Veterans Success Center.

**Veterans Success Center Open House** 



## **American Indian Heritage Month Artwork**



In celebration of American Indian Heritage Month 2014, the MSU-Northern Multicultural Center is exhibiting the surrealistic art work of Native artist and MSU-Northern graduate Brad J. Shields. His piece titled "Tribal Existence," is a colorful canvas that can be displayed in either portrait or landscape orientation. Shields says the piece is a look into the first century of Indian perspective on surrealism. It depicts a recurring dream he had ... "molded through the mind of a spiritually anointing mix of modern-future primitive tribal existence." The buildings on one corner represent the urban part of Indian life. On the opposite one, the teepee with the circle inside symbolizes the center of the universe for Natives.

However, it is the center of the piece that draws viewer's attention: there are two figures of Natives and a monster of some sort. Shield adds, "I used to have this recurring dream that a demon was going to take me, but thanks to my grandfather's teachings and because I'm very connected to my ways, that demon could never take me." The piece also includes other Native motifs such as deer antlers and a feather. "Art comes in all forms," Shields concludes. Everyone is invited to visit the Multicultural Center and admire Shields's art. The Center is open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. through 5 p.m. The MSU-N Office of Diversity Awareness and

Thursday, November 20, 2014 at 12:00 p.m. (NOON) and 5:30 p.m.


Both sessions will take place in the library basement, Computer Lab B. During the sessions you will learn about the following information:

#### **Windows 8 Tips**

Back to Basics: Navigation, part 1

When you start Windows 8 it opens on the lock screen, which looks pretty but unfortunately doesn't really give you any clues about what to do next.

Just tap the space bar, spin the mouse wheel or swipe upwards on a touch screen to reveal a regular login screen. Enter your username and password to begin.

Windows 8's interface is all colorful tiles and touch-friendly applications. If you're using a tablet then it's all be very straightforward: just swipe left or right to scroll the screen, and tap any tile of interest. On a regular desktop you can spin the mouse wheel to scroll backward and forward. You can also use the keyboard to scroll left and right - just press the **Home** or **End** key and jump from one end of your Start screen to the other.

You can right-click apps you don't need and select **Unpin** to remove them. And you can drag and drop the tiles around to organize them as you like.

The Start screen apps are initially displayed in fairly randomly, but it's easy to sort them into customized groups: Pinch your fingers together on the Start screen or click the little minus icon in the lower right-hand corner (it's at the end of the horizontal scroll bar) to zoom out and see all the tiles that are on your start screen. To rearrange the groups, press and hold or click and drag the group to move it to a new position. You can name your groups by right-clicking on the background and then clicking **Name groups**. Select which group you want to name, and type a name.
