MAT's "On Borrowed Time" Opens Tonight



What happens when the rules of life and death don't apply? "On Borrowed Time" is a play that examines the role death plays in life. It was written by Paul Osborn and directed by Montana Actors' Theatre's Anthony Cammon and Casey Pratt. The MAT group is calling this play a "Dramedy" (drama/comedy), so come out and enjoy the intrigue combined with lots of laughs.

The play will run October 17-18, 23-25, 30-31 and November 1 in the theater in Cowan Hall. Doors and backstage lounge open at 7:30 p.m. each night, and the show begins at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$15 for adults, \$10 for students and seniors, and MSUN students are admitted free with current I.D.s.

Fall Career Fair

The Armory Gymnasium was full of bustling activity on Monday, October 13 as Northern hosted the first career fair of the academic year. The Career Center was able to bring 34 employers to campus seeking opportunities to visit with students from every major offered at Northern. This is the largest number ever to attend for the fall event. Just fewer than 200 students attended the fair, and many took advantage of the time to interview with eight employers who have openings for co-ops and full-time placement.

Butler Machinery and Wood Group were the two Gold Sponsors, while Crossroads Correctional Center, GE Transportation, Shopko Stores, Tractor and Equipment and Tri-County Implement were the Maroon Sponsors. All seven employers reported that they were pleased to be able to talk to many students about career opportunities.

The Career Center would like to thank everyone for their help in setting up and tearing down for the big day. A special thank you goes out to all of the crew at the Athletic Department, Physical Plant, Food Services, Event Coordinator, Vande Bogart Library, Admissions, Advising Center, Financial Aid Office, Student Support Services, IT Department, and the faculty who brought students to the fair, released students from class to attend, or gave extra credit to their students to attend. All of your hard work, and willingness to give up your offices for interview rooms, is greatly appreciated! Many employers and students thanked the Career Center for the extra elbow room in the gym, the nice table displays, awesome breakfast and lunch, and nice rooms for interviewing.

The next career fair will be held on Monday, February the 9th from 9 a.m.-noon in the Armory Gym. We encourage all students to prepare for the next stream of employers who will be here at that time. Faculty Enjoy Quality Matters Workshop

This week a number of Northern faculty members took part in a Quality Matters workshop. Quality Matters (QM) is a nationally recognized and faculty-centered organization to which MSU-Northern subscribes. QM's mission is to help educators improve the design of online and blended courses. Their flagship product is a rubric of best practices for online/blended course design, and in Saturday's workshop our faculty learned how to apply the QM rubric to their courses. In addition to onsite workshops, Quality Matters offers online training that is available to our faculty and also provides a process for faculty-driven peer review of courses.

There was no charge to participants, and there was a full house, with 26 attendees. All 26 earned certification on applying the QM rubric. It was a very good day, filled with great discussions and participation from the instructors.


Halloween Costume Dance - Oct 31

Lecture Combines History and Culture - Nov. 6

The Montana State University-Northern, Chancellor's Lecture Series will host "Before the Homesteaders: The Northern Montana Buffalo Slaughter" with Dr. Donald Klinko on Thursday, November 6, 2014. The performance will be at the Applied Technology Center, Hensler Auditorium, at 7:30 p.m. The presentation is free and open to the public.

Klinko shares his findings and interest in the methodical slaughter of most of the North American bison population of the Great Plains during the period 1871 to 1884. One of its many interesting characteristics is the historical confluence of technology, necessity and a vastly improved transportation network. All of these components for an industrial slaughter of the species appeared within the two-year period 1869-1871. Klinko describes the effect on the Native American populations in the region and the American cattle industry.

Vintage Northern

"The Golden Goose" is missing! Around the first of October in 1951, the Goose was discovered to be missing from the campus. The Chief of Police and the Hill County Sheriff were called to help locate the missing bus. The Goose, a 1924 vintage white touring bus, was originally used in Yellowstone National Park to ferry tourists. After retiring from Yellowstone, the bus was used during World War II for transporting the Havre Civil Aeronautics Flying Corp. to the airfield. After the war, it was parked and forgotten by its owner - the federal government - in a garage on the Northern Montana College campus. It was resurrected when NMC became the new owner. The bus was repainted, in school colors of course, and began its new life greeting new students at the bus and train stations and participating in parades and campus activities. Early in the morning of October 8, the Goose was found after an unauthorized excursion to Fort Assiniboine. By late afternoon, the Goose, with one of the windows broken, was returned to the Northern campus. New restrictions were added to limit the availability of the key to the Golden Goose.

Windows 8.1 Tip Configure Automatic App Updates

Unlike Windows 8, app updates in Windows 8.1 are automatically installed by default without the user's consent. To stop this from happening:

- 1. Open the Windows Store
- 2. Open the Charms settings (swipe from the right side of your screen or hover your mouse in the upper or lower right corner of your screen). The charms settings must be opened after you are in the Windows Store or else it will not display the required menu.
- 3. Select Settings and then App Updates.
- 4. You can now enable or disable the option to automatically update apps. If you disable the automatic updates, this is also were you can manually check for updates.

Fish or Fishes?

Even though we were supposed to have locked down the understanding of word plurals in grade school, as adults many of us are stumped by whether or not we use the correct plural form of certain words in writing and speech. One such word that has troubled me in recent days is the plural of "fish." Especially now that I have a young son, I find myself using the term "fishes" when showing him a tank of fish. (I don't know why two-syllable words seem to fit so much better when speaking to a one-year-old.)

After a bit of investigating, I've found that the commonly accepted plural of "fish" is indeed, simply "fish;" however, there are some exceptions. Oftentimes in scientific literature, authors refer to varying species of fish as "types of fishes." This is the most common exception to the rule. Mignon Fogarty of "Grammar Girl's Quick and Dirty Tips" points out that "fishes" is also used in the Bible when Jesus feeds a crowd with five loaves and two fishes. A couple of even more current common uses of "fishes" is *The Godfather* quote when someone "sleeps with the fishes" and the phrase "if wishes were fishes." Fogarty thus concludes: "The Quick and Dirty Tip is that the plural of 'fish' is 'fish,' unless you're writing about different species of fish, are a mobster, are quoting the Bible, or are trying to
