The agenda included several panel discussions with experts from around the state gathered to offer their input. The schedule also included various small group discussion times and sessions on "The Student Experience: A



Explaining her piece "Air of Innocence," Nault said, "The Sugarbeet Festival in Chinook, Montana, draws a diverse group of people. As I was enjoying the festivities, several children came running by. One in particular stood out. Boy or girl? Then I saw the feather earrings. I had to have a picture because I knew I wanted to paint her. I decided to do her in batik, concentrating on the variations of skin tones and working to portray an 'Air of Innocence.'"


Jennifer Anderson You Are Pure Gold

Flansburg's internship went well, and she was content with her work crew for most of the internship. She was surprised by the tasks she was called on to complete during her internship, namely the amount of scanning her work involved, but she did not complain. She recognized the experience as a meaningful stepping-stone towards her greater goals.

Being a mother of three made the execution of an internship more complicated for Flansburg than for most, and that was the biggest challenge during her summer- maintaining enough energy to enjoy her time with her girls once they were all together at the end of a workday. She looks forward to starting her actual career in the health field, during which she will be able to choose where she works and live where she works to cut down on commute time. Flansburg plans to work for a few years after graduating from Northern, and then she will pursue even loftier goals by pursuing her master's degree.

Student Co-op Registration is Open for Spring Semester

All co-ops are registered and administered through CareerExpress, unlike the regular classes in which students enroll. Each student must have a profile on CareerExpress before he or she can register for a co-op. Every co-op requires relevant learning objectives and approval by the student's advisor, employer, dean of the appropriate college, and the director of the Career Center. It is not the Career Center or MSUN's responsibility to find a co-op for a student. The center can provide assistance, but students need to find employers who will work with them for this on-the-job learning experience.
