Knife River Corporation Donates \$50,000 to MSUN Diesel Technology Center

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Yesterday, Knife River Corporation presented Montana State University-Northern with a \$50,000 gift for the new Diesel Technology Center. The gift was presented during the 8th annual TekNoXpo. Dave Zinke, Region President for Knife River Corporation's Montana and Wyoming operations, and Gary Forrester, Montana government affairs lobbyist for MDU Resources Group, were on site for the presentation.

Knife River Corporation mines aggregates and markets crushed stone, sand, gravel and related construction materials, including ready-mix concrete, cement, asphalt, liquid asphalt and other value-added products. It also performs integrated contracting services. Knife River is a Top 10 producer of aggregates in America, employs nearly 5,000 people during peak construction season, and has physical locations in 15 states and

operates in 19 states. Knife River is a subsidiary of MDU Resources Group, Inc. headquartered in Bismarck, North Dakota.

"Diesel mechanical expertise is critical to our operations, and we appreciate the graduates of MSU-Northern's diesel technology program - those who have worked with us in the past and those who will work with us in the future," said Zinke. "We are happy to support programs that are critical to our industry and to the communities where we do business."

"We are very grateful to Knife River Corporation and MDU Resources Group for their support of our new Diesel Technology Center," said MSU-Northern Chancellor, Greg Kegel. "We are pleased that everything is moving forward on the new building and we plan on doing a ground breaking ceremony on Friday, May the 20th, during the Board of Regents meeting which will take place on our campus," said Kegel.

Little River Institute Indigenous Education Conference



In 2015, Montana State University-Northern's Extended University received a five-year, \$1.9 million grant through the Native American Serving Nontribal Institutions (NASNTI) Program of the U.S. Department of Education. The grant is intended to improve the retention and completion rates of American Indian students in higher education. As part of this grant, the Little River Institute was created to serve as a center of tutoring, mentoring, and support for American Indian students at MSU-Northern, as well as a source of culturally responsive professional development for MSU-Northern faculty and staff.

MSU-Northern is proud to be hosting the First Annual Little River Institute Indigenous Education Conference. This is a chance for faculty, staff, and students from across Montana to come together for a conversation about the experiences, triumphs, and struggles of American Indian students in higher education.

Yesterday marked the beginning of the First Annual Little River Institute Indigenous Education Conference, which will continue until Saturday. So far the conference has featured presenters and keynote speakers such as: Montana Superintendent of Public Instruction, Denise Juneau; President of Antioch University Seattle, Dr. Cassandra Manuelito-Kerkvliet; Mike Jetty of OPI; Cheryl and Manuel Morales of Aaniiih Nakoda College; Julie Brown, an MSU graduate student; and Greg Drummer of Aaniiih Nakoda College.

The remainder of the conference promises to be enlightening, including presentations by: Director of Indian Education, OPI, Mandy Smoker Broaddus; Dr. Pearl Yellowman; Allesandro Foursouls; Dr. Donna Miller of

Aaniiih Nakoda College; Brad Hall an MSU doctoral student; Dan Kinsey of Aaniiih Nakoda College; Dr. Sue King; Angela McLean, Director of American Indian/Minority Achievement, OCHE

Another honored guest of the conference is Christian "Supaman" Takes the Gun Parrish. Christian is a Crow hip-hop artist and fancy dancer. Christian Takes the Gun Parrish, aka "Supaman," is a dancer and hip hop artist who has dedicated his life to empowering youth and educating listeners with a message of hope through culture and music.


Student Senate Inauguration

Northern Renovates Lab for National Coalition Certification



Monumental updates have taken place in Northern's Electronics Building. Rooms ELEC 102 and 103 have gotten a facelift like you wouldn't believe, and more murals and signage are on the way to liven up the hall and classroom walls. Beyond the obvious additions of new flooring, countertops and seating, many technical updates have made these rooms an official NC3 (National Coalition of Certification Centers) Member School. Some of the main upgrades include five torque Snap-on tool carts, three Skidmore-Wilhelm bolt tension sets, two advanced diagnostic two scan tools carts, one multi-meter cart, one precision measurement cart, and three tools at height carts. Soon, the faculty will install a new short throw projector that can display a 60-inch by 100-inch screen which functions as a smartboard on the wall from only twelve inches away.

The additions to these labs open a wide array of opportunities for Northern students to receive Industry Recognized credentials. Through these labs, qualified instructors can teach courses to help students gain credentials in digital multi-meter, mechanical and electronic torque, precision measurement instruments, scan

tools, and working safely with tools at height. Northern will be imbedding the NC3 credentials into the coursework of the appropriate degree programs. Once the transformation is complete, the faculty hopes to be able to offer this credentialing to the industry partners' employees, as interest and need arise. Diesel Technology Faculty Trainer, Aaron Riggin has been working to condense various multi-day trainings into 1-day trainings in order to offer employed workers who want or need new certifications.

These upgrades have been made possible in part by the TAACCCT (Trade Adjustment Assistance and Community College and Career Training) III Grant dispersed among 13 campuses for a total of \$25 million dollars. Northern is honored to have received a portion of this grant and looks forward to all of the amazing opportunities that will arise through the establishment of these new labs.

Science at Northern - Really Big Laboratories



MSU-Northern students have had an exciting spring semester as participants in numerous outdoor field labs that provided opportunities to learn more about the region. Beginning the first week in April, students in the Rocky Mountain flora course began field trips to the surrounding Bear Paw Mountains and badlands north of the Milk River to collect plant specimens. Although an upper division elective (BIOB 335/336), this course required no pre-requisites and its objective is to increase plant awareness and appreciation in non-biology and biology students alike. As part of the course, students gathered and pressed specimens that were added to the MSU-Northern Herbarium (HSC 204), a natural history collection that represents regional plant diversity. Sometimes, distractions during a field lab occur, for example, the discovery of a horned toad that was closely examined by all.

The ornithology course (BIOB 470/471) included several local field excursions that begin with early bird migration the first week of April. In addition to visiting local areas (Sands Waterfowl Protection Area, Fresno Wildlife Refuge, and Kremlin Bay, Fresno Reservoir) to observe birds, an all-day field trip on April 16 took place at Bowdoin National Wildlife Refuge, just east of Malta, Montana. Students observed nearly 40 different birds including a bald eagle, double-crested cormorants, pelicans, and a short-ear owl hunting for its breakfast. One of the highlights of the refuge is Swan Island, where students viewed hundreds of tundra swans.
