Montana State University-Northern has joined the other campuses in the Montana University System in becoming a tobacco-free campus. Signs will be going up around campus in the next few weeks.

Specifically, the use of tobacco by students, faculty, staff, guests, visitors, and contractors will be prohibited on all properties owned or leased by MSUN.

Tobacco includes any tobacco product including, but not limited to a lighted or unlighted cigarette, cigar, pipe, bidi, hookah, and all forms of smokeless tobacco and any nicotine delivery device that has not been approved by the FDA for cessation.

Northern Examines Healthcare Apprenticeships

Montana State University-Northern, as part the HealthCARE Montana grant, has added new programs within the Department of Nursing. These include Phlebotomy, EMT/EMS and Paramedic certificate programs.

MSU-Northern has been asked to develop an apprenticeship in Phlebotomy. MSU Northern has extensive experience providing apprenticeships throughout Montana and the surrounding states. An apprenticeship is a work model in which employees are hired and paid while receiving the required education and on the job hours in pursuit of a licensure or certification.

In September, the Department of Nursing will be sending out a survey to Hi-line Healthcare Facilities to determine the interest in hiring and investing in phlebotomy apprenticeships. Students participating in the phlebotomy apprenticeships will be able to do their course work online and perform their lab skills training and competencies at MSU-Northern on the weekends.

Artist of the Month - September

Gifting-Ravens Always Get It Done Right

The MSUN Multicultural Center receives Lisa Lang as the first artist of the month for the 2016-2017 school year. Lang currently resides in Haidaburg, Alaska (her clan is the Yaghwlaanas, Haida Raven-Subclan-Two Finned Killer Whale). She studied Federal Indian Law at the University of New Mexico and currently is the Executive Director of the Xaadas Kil Kuyaas Foundation, (Precious Haida Words) an institution dedicated to promote, preserve, and perpetuate the rich cultural legacy of the Alaska Haida dialect.

Lang is presenting a 19" x 15" canvas titled *Gifting-Ravens Always Get It Done Right*. In regards to the piece she adds, "A woman is reflected as an image of what we carry inside of us. This piece was given with intentions of healing, helping, and giving unconditionally. If you see and feel this emotion then, you have those gifts inside you as well."

Lang notes: "I am Haida, and we are artists: it is a part of our culture and identity, and it is our Native way to give, whether it is our food, our artwork, or our love for each other. The



majority of my art has been donated to raise funds for my community to assist individuals and families. This piece was created specifically to donate to a family, and I was inspired to paint just for that reason-to give. My work is contemporary Haida art. I will be creating more art work, so I will begin commissioning pieces as in my community we are forming a local non-profit artist coop. I am truly honored to have this piece on exhibition in Montana."

Haida art is the art of the indigenous people of the Pacific Northwest Coast of North America; it is globally recognized for their monumental totem poles and fine carved sculptures in primarily wood, but also in metal, slate, and weaving. In many cases elongated shapes are one of the recurring elements. Many of them are inspired by the ocean's life: killer whales, sea lions, and supernatural creatures are some of the elements.

Dave Caserio and Parker Brown: "Walt Whitman and the Civil War" - Sept. 20

Caserio presents a dramatic, high-energy, Reader's-Theatre performance based on the work of Walt Whitman, followed by an open-ended discussion of the material and the literary, contemporary, and historical questions and issues that it invokes. His performance is accompanied by Parker Brown on acoustic bass. Based on the poetry, prose, journals, and letters of Walt Whitman, Caserio takes the audience from the election of Abraham Lincoln to the heady onset of the Civil War, from battlefield to the hospital ward, through the long years of war to the conflict's end and the death of Lincoln.

Kristi Hager: "Dueling Paintbrushes: George Catlin and Karl Bodmer on the Missouri" - Oct. 4
Two painters traveled up the Missouri River within a year of each other, George Catlin in 1832, Karl
Bodmer in 1833. They had very different temperaments and very different styles of painting the same
Indian villages, the same chiefs, the same sacred rituals, the same bison herds, the same river bluffs.
Catlin and Bodmer also documented how each tribe painted accounts of their own lives in their own style

on tipis, drums, and buffalo hides. This abundance of painting is a rich visual record of the High Plains at a unique time after Lewis & Clark, but before the arrival of railways and photography.

Chere Jiusto and Christine Brown: "Hand-Raised: The Historic Barns of Montana" - Nov. 3

The historic barns of Montana are a threatened part of our heritage. To capture their history and encourage their preservation, Chere Jiusto, Christine Brown and photographer Tom Ferris collaborated on the award-winning book Hand Raised: Historic Barns of Montana, released by Montana Historical Society Press in 2011. This conversation includes an overview of Montana's barn-building history, stunning photographs of barns from across the state, and the stories attached to some of Montana's most memorable, photogenic, and historic barns.

Fall 2016 Indigenous Movie Nights

The series, sponsored by the Native American Studies Program, showcases films written, directed, produced, and cast by American Indian & Indigenous artists and filmmakers. Each film is followed by a short discussion about the major themes and issues within the stories. Everybody is welcome. 
A Northern Technology Tidbit

The First Computer Spreadsheet

Pictured is an image of an old box from my office desk which contained a manual and software called VisiCalc. VisiCalc was an abbreviation for "visible calculator" and somewhat similar to our present day Microsoft Excel. Various internet articles and written sources note that Dan Bricklin came up with the idea for this innovative, electronic spreadsheet software while he was a student at the Harvard Business School in 1978. It is reported that he got the idea for his software when he thought there had to be a better way to demonstrate a change in a large table of numbers without writing down, over and over again, many numbers in rows and columns to reflect the change. Dan joined with Bob Frankston to develop the software and their company first sold VisiCalc spreadsheet software in 1979 for use on Apple II computers.

The software from this box was run from a floppy disk (no hard drives on our computers back then) and was used on an Apple IIe in the early 1980's by my students in the agriculture program, at what was then called Northern Montana College. I quickly fell in love with VisiCalc and



its many capabilities and this probably explains why I have kept the box. I have used many other versions of spreadsheet software since and examples of these include Lotus 1-2-3, VP Planner, Quattro Pro and of course the now ubiquitous Microsoft Excel. What if (spreadsheet lovers will get this) Dan Bricklin had not envisioned and co-developed this marvelous technology?

Computer Corner

Get rid of ads in your Windows 10 Start menu

If you're running Windows 10 with default settings, you've probably noticed apps in the right (tile) side of your Start menu -- apps that you didn't put there. Clicking on these "apps" opens up the Store, where you can purchase and download them. Microsoft calls them "suggestions," but they're really just ads. Fortunately, getting rid of these ads (sorry, suggestions) is a guick fix.

- 1. Open the **Start** menu and select **Settings**
- Go to Personalization and select Start.
- 3. You'll see several toggles, but the second one should say "Occasionally show suggestions in Start." Turn this toggle to Off and close the Settings menu. (Note: if you don't see the option to toggle suggestions off, you're not on a current build of Windows 10.)

That's all you have to do, but while you're at it, you might also want to turn off the unique advertising ID that Microsoft assigns you so it can track your movement across Windows Store apps... and then serve you targeted ads. This is also enabled by default during a stock Windows installation.

- 1. Open the **Start** menu and select **Settings**
- 2. Go to **Privacy** and select **General**
- 3. Slide "Let apps use my advertising ID for experience across apps (turning this off will reset your ID)" to off.
