Natalee Faupel Becomes New All-time Leading Scorer



Heading into last night's game against UGF, Skylight senior Natalee Faupel was a single point behind Jodi Kruta for second on the Skylight all-time career scoring list. Last night, she surpassed not only Jodi Kruta, but she also broke Shiela Green's 25-year record of 1566 points. Faupel is now the new all-time leading scorer and there are still many games left in the season.

Last night, during the half time of the men's basketball game Natalee Faupel was presented with a basketball and plaque commemorating her accomplishment. Presenting the ball was Athletic Director Christian Oberquell, her mother, Cheri, Skylight basketball coach Chris Mouat, and MSU-Northern Chancellor Greg Kegel.

During her career, Natalee has received countless honors and has helped lead the Skylights to three straight NAIA National Tournaments. She has won eleven Frontier Player of the Week Awards and has earned Academic All-Conference honors three times. She has also been a First Team All-Frontier selection twice, and was last year's Frontier Conference Most Valuable Player. She was also a WBCA and NAIA First Team All-American.

Natalee now stands alone as the all-time leading scorer in Skylight history. Congratulations, Natalee, you make Northern proud!

Northern Partakes in National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week

This past week, several MSU-Northern staff and faculty members, and representatives from the Hill County Health Department organized a week of events to increase awareness of prescription drug abuse for the campus and the greater community. The following activities were part of that week:

"Bitter Pill" Art Exhibition



Monday night, Renee Nelson, an intelligence research specialist with the Drug Enforcement Agency's pharmaceutical diversion in Billings and the curator of the traveling art exhibit entitled "Bitter Pill: Montana Lives Affected By RX Abuse," This show is a traveling art exhibit featuring more than 30 pieces by professional and amateur artists. It documents experiences and views on prescription and opiate drug addiction and recovery. It is meant to raise discussion about the issues of prescription drug and opioid addiction. This unique display of art will be on display in the Vande Bogart Library through Sunday.

Documentary & Discussion: "Chasing the Dragon"

On Tuesday MSUN students and staff and community members attended the showing of a documentary put out by the FBI and the DEA to raise awareness of opioid abuse and the downward spiral often caused by addiction. This documentary gave a face to the horrific effects of opiate addiction. Following the film, attendees discussed the difficulties in confronting friends and family members along with how to safeguard their homes. Pharmacist, Dominique Preputin, reminded the audience of "Take Back" programs, where pharmacies and the police station provide receptacles for consumers to properly dispose of their unused or leftover medications. Prescription Drug Abuse in Hill County



On Wednesday, CJ Reichelt, Team Leader for the Tri-Agency Drug Taskforce & Audrey Barger, Judge of the Hill County Drug Court discussed the impact of prescription drug abuse in our community. Sgt. Reichelt shared information about actual pharmaceutical drug cases he has worked in Hill County and addressed many questions from the audience. Judge Barger had seven volunteers from the audience represent seven different scenarios of actual drug abuse. Each scenario started with a different set of problems. By the time they were done most ended up in jail, homeless and/or without a job. Most of the problems started out with a simple drink or pill just to calm their nerves, and before long, they had lost everything. This was one of the most graphic, yet tragic reminders of how things can go horribly wrong when people make the wrong choices.

Panel Discussion

Last night, representatives from health care, addiction treatment services, law enforcement, the judicial system, reservation communities, along with community members in recovery addressed MSUN and the greater Hill County community in a discussion about prescription drug abuse.

Northern Hosts OneMSU Suicide Prevention and Student Mental Health Meeting

In the spring of 2015, at the request of the Commissioner of Higher Education and the Montana Board of Regents, the Suicide Prevention and Student Mental Health Task Force was formed to assess student mental health services and suicide prevention efforts throughout the Montana University System (MUS) and make recommendations for improvement.

The Task Force consisted of 24 diverse members representing MUS and community colleges. They developed three objectives:

- 1. Develop and host a statewide summit on suicide prevention
- 2. Conduct assessments of current practices and policies and recommend changes and improvements
- 3. Develop best practices and common training approaches that can be shared and followed by campuses

MSU President Waded Cruzado wants the MSU campuses to not only meet the taskforce objectives but to make recommendations that will exceed basic expectations. To accomplish this, Cruzado sent MSU-Bozeman's Vice President, Dr. Chris Kearns, Dean of Students, Matt Caires, and their Director of Counseling and Psychological Services, Elizabeth Asserson to meet with members of MSU-Great Falls, MSU-Billings and MSU-Northern to discuss and develop an OneMSU plan to implement the recommendations from the task force on the MSU campuses.

On January 12th, the representatives from Bozeman met with members from the Northern campus. The discussion centered around Suicide Prevention Gatekeeper Training, Clinical Services, Behavioral Intervention Teams, Lethal Means Restrictions and Postvention. The goal is for members of each campus to work on a template to gather information from each campus and make recommendations to OCHE in the form of a OneMUS report/recommendation.


Women in Traditionally Male Dominated Fields - Feb. 9

Yvonne Tiger: "IndiVisible: African-Native American Lives in Americas - A collection of the Smithsonian Institute's traveling exhibit and Yvonne Tiger lecture" - Feb. 21

Tuesday, February 21: MSU-Northern Vande Bogart Library

Within the fabric of American identity is woven a story that has long been invisible-the lives and experiences of people who share African American and Native American ancestry. "IndiVisible" is the Smithsonian Institute's traveling exhibit that reveals unique information about the little-known history of people with dual African-American and Native American ancestry. It is a display of large panels that discuss the cultural integration of these blended marriages and the ancestors caught between preserving their individual heritage and embracing both cultures. Art historian, Yvonne Tiger, earned a Master of Arts in History and a Master of Arts in Art History from Smith College in Northampton, Massachusetts. Her Art History degree focused on Native Americans. Yvonne Tiger's Tribes (Cherokee, Creek, Seminole) are intrinsically linked into this history and are featured in the "IndiVisible" display.

Joan Bird: "UFOs and Extraterrestrials in Montana" - Mar. 30

Growing Fonts at Northern



The ability to use devices to easily vary font sizes when preparing teaching and presentation material is wonderful. My early years of teaching and learning were handicapped by small font sizes. Instructors were mostly limited to 10 point Courier and many students and conference attendees squinted to see small typeface when text was projected onto screens. We had one electric IBM typewriter in Brockmann Center that had a typeball which one could manually change to make a little larger font. Early word processing software also lacked in making variable font sizes which forced me to acquire special label software. Early dot matrix printers had limitations as well, when printing larger fonts.

Pictured with this article are some plotter pens from the past and a color transparency that I made many years ago. Northern's drafting program had acquired amazing carousel pen plotters and these were able to plot vector based colored text and graphics onto paper and overhead transparency film. What a marvelous advancement in presentation technologies! I distinctly remember working late one night in the mid-1980s with our current chancellor and using AutoCAD drawing software to make a series of large colored text transparencies. These were for former Northern President Bill Merwin to use at a presentation in Helena. I attended the presentation and the projected text was large, crisp, colored and very impressive to the audience until a leading legislator pointed out that the word school was misspelled on one of our high tech Northern transparencies! Unfortunately, everyone in the room was able to clearly see the stunning, albeit incorrect, word. The presentation went on but the remaining marvelous transparencies were abandoned! Enjoy and learn from today's many wonderful fonts: use them correctly and appreciate their growth.

Northern Sports Recap

January 20

In Frontier Conference action, Northern hosted the Montana Tech Orediggers and came out with a sweep.

The No. 11 **Skylights** held off a fourth quarter comeback by the Orediggers to win the contest 56-52. The Skylights leading scorer was senior forward Sierra Richards with 17 points (seven rebounds). Northern moves to 5-2 in the Frontier (15-3 overall).

A stingy defensive effort by the **Lights** allowed them to cruise pastTech 62-36. Leading the way for Northern was senior forward David Straughter with 15 points (six rebounds). With the win, the Lights move up to 4-3 in conference play (14-4 overall).

January 21

In their second home game of the weekend, the MSU-Northern took on Lewis-Clark State College. The **women's game** was a battle the entire contest, but the No. 2 Warriors pulled away in the fourth quarter to defeat the No. 11 Skylights 75-66. Senior guard Natalee Faupel led the charge for Northern with 27 points and seven rebounds. The Skylights are now 5-3 in conference play (15-4 overall).

In the **men's contest**, LC State hit 11 three-point shots in the game to help them get the 67-49 win over the Lights. Junior guard Cameron Epps paced the Lights with 12 points. Northern now holds a 4-4 record in the Frontier Conference (15-5 overall).

In wrestling action, the No. 3 Lights traveled to Marshall, Missouri to participate in the Missouri Valley Invitational. Out of the 33 teams in attendance, Northern finished fifth with 102 points. Senior Ben Stroh (184) claimed yet another tournament title with a 9-3 decision in the championship match. Sophomore Brandon Weber (157) placed second in his weight division while his brother Matt Weber (sophomore) finished third in the 141 division. Also claiming a spot on the podium was senior Taylor Kornoely (285) who finished fifth in the heavyweight division.

Breaking Records

Lights junior forward Ryan Reeves recently became the new record holder for most blocks in a single-season by finishing with four against UM-Western to give him 41 on the season. He surpassed Kevin Owens' single-season record of 40 set back in the 1994-95 season. Reeves is currently sitting at 43 total blocks after this weekend's contests.

Recently, I've had a few students ask how they should prepare for the Spring 2017 Career Fair. To answer their questions, I've given the following information:

CAREEREXPRESS: If you don't have an account on CareerExpress, GET ONE! This online system offered through the Career Center is your key to information. Once you've built a profile, you can view all of the employers who are coming to the fair so you know who you want to visit with that day.

RESEARCH: One of the biggest pet-peeves of employers who recruit from Northern is that the students have no idea who they are. Use CareerExpress, Google, Bing or other search engines to research the companies you are interested in. The representatives of those companies will be highly impressed that you've done your research and have more questions for them at the Fair.

DRESS: Many universities require students to dress in business attire when attending a university-sponsored Career Fair for their students. MSUN Career Center does not make that requirement, however we do wish to see our students dressed nicely. While it is understandable that students are in classes that day, they should be mindful of the representation they give to employers. Clean jeans and shirts that are tucked in is an adequate presentation. Also, remember to wash your hands for the handshakes you will be doing and make sure your hair is neatly combed. Please do NOT wear sweatpants, pajamas or bunny slippers! However, if you are interviewing with any employers that day then you do need to dress in business attire.

RESUMES: I highly suggest that students make sure their resumes are current and in excellent condition. Be sure you have faculty and staff edit your resume to check for any errors before handing them to employers. The deadline for editing help on your resume from the Career Center is Monday, January 30th. Make sure you have a folder to keep them in for protection and have made enough copies to hand out to the employers you are interested in.

PRESENTATION: Our culture likes firm handshakes and eye contact. Practice those things with a friend or even in front of a mirror and then use the technique at the Fair.

FINALLY: Don't forget to ask for their business card! You never know when that contact information will come in handy.

The fair will be held on Thursday, February 9th from 9am-noon in the Armory Gymnasium. It is open to employers, students and alumni. Employers have until February 2nd to register and we anticipate a large number this spring.

Cleaning up your desktop

There's nothing wrong with a messy desk, but at some point you might need to impose a little order on the chaos. Cleaning the piles of paper and junk from your real-life office desk might take a weekend of labor but cleaning up a Windows desktop is considerably easier.

If you like the convenience of using the Desktop folder as a temporary storage place, you can hide the clutter in seconds: Right-click any empty space on the desktop, hover over **View**, and then click to remove the checkmark from **Show Desktop Icons**. All the Desktop icons will vanish. But don't worry, all your shortcuts and files are still there, they're just no longer covering up your chosen background image or slideshow. You can go back and re-check the **Show Desktop Icons** box to show them all again on the desktop, or you can open File Explorer and click **Desktop** under **Favorites** in the left section of the screen, or type and **Desktop**

in the address bar. In Windows 8 or 10 you could also **Pin** a Desktop shortcut to the Start menu for easy access.

A couple other options on the desktop's **View** menu allow you to change icon size (fair warning: the large Icons setting will make the icons is *really* large), and to align the desktop icons to a grid so they snap neatly into position.
