### **Lights Win First Round of the Frontier Conference playoffs**

After a tough home loss to the Battlin' Bears of Rocky Mountain College on senior night last Saturday, the MSU-Northern Lights bounced back as they defeated RMC 71-54 in the first round of the Frontier Conference playoffs.

A Ryan Reeves block followed by a Cameron Epps three pointer on the first possession of the game set the tone for the Lights. At the 18:20 mark of the first half, Northern built an 8-2 lead after David Straughter buried a shot from behind the arc. Rocky Mountain and Northern battled over the next five minutes to trade the lead twice and at 13:03, the Battlin' Bears moved ahead 13-12. This was the last time they led for the rest of the contest. Northern's largest lead of the half came at the 7:23 mark as they pulled ahead 29-16.

The Lights shot an impressive 51.7 percent from the field (15-of-29) in the first half and went 6-of-12 from beyond the arc. Five Northern players scored in double digits. Straughter paced the Lights with 12 points and eight rebounds. Reeves also helped the Lights as he scored 10 points, pulled down nine rebounds, and tallied five blocks. Epps and Tyler Chandler each had 11 points and Charles Porter chipped in 10 points.

The Lights now move their focus to round two action as they travel to Helena to take on the No. 4 Carroll College Fighting Saints on Saturday night at 7:00 PM. For game information, please visit [golightsgo.com](http://golightsgo.com).

She adds, "*Existency* is about just that. I created this piece after viewing the artwork on Instagram and was inspired. I grabbed whatever paint I had and a piece of glass I had found while recycling and created this piece. While I was making it I thought about how I was happy to be making art, and how it didn't matter if anyone would see it, I was just happy to be alive, happy to exist. Flow art isn't completely 100% predictable, and that's part of the reason it attracted my attention. The swirls, metallics, and gloss rely on each other to co-exist and create something beautiful. When I finished the piece, I felt very content, and I realized it reminded me of the pictures I have seen of Earth. I've been asking myself a lot about why I do the things that I do, specifically running and art. Why

does it matter so much? This piece taught me that it doesn't necessarily matter why, it just matters that it is. It matters that it exists and that I exist. And that's enough."

*Existency* is a symmetric round piece with radius of 10 inches. Its medium is acrylic, tempra, and spray paint on glass.

### Northern Technology Snapshot

### Northern Tractor Education

Northern was quite involved in improving agricultural tractor field performance in the 1990s. This was an era when farmers were facing tractor challenges involving power hop, tire management, high diesel prices, ballasting and tractor maintenance. Faculty members Greg Clouse, Lynn Stilger and I developed a tractor resource center to assist farmers with tractor management. We were able to secure several grants that enabled us to purchase mobile scales and in-field tractor test instrumentation. Our group formed a working relationship with agricultural engineers and technicians from the Alberta Farm Machinery Research Centre (AFMRC). They assisted us with our equipment and together we developed in-field tractor test procedures. In return, Northern provided the AFMRC with tractor clinics and helped with tractor performance research under different field conditions and with different combinations of ballast, tires, tire air pressures and rubber tracks.

Some of the data acquisition devices we used are displayed on the companion photo. The blue load cell allowed us to measure up to 50,000 pounds of pull. Radar guns were used to measure ground and wheel speed and an accelerometer to record power hop. A laptop computer and data acquisition box was placed in the cab of the tractor. We field tested and set up many tractors and conducted tractor clinics for hundreds of farmers in Canada and Montana. This test equipment was also used for teaching Northern students who sometimes assisted us with workshops and testing. Steven Don, now with the College of Technical Sciences, and Northern graduate Scott Strobel were also employed with the tractor center. Northern has a rich and storied history of offering technical education and outreach to the public we serve and this is one of many examples.

# Northern Sports Recap

## February 16

The No. 15 **Skylights** had their highest offensive output of conference play as they defeated the Lady Argos for the third time this season with a score of 81-63 in Great Falls. Northern was led by senior guards Natalee Faupel (25 points, 9 rebounds) and Molly Kreycik (16 points, 6 rebounds). With the win, the Skylights moved to 19-7 on the season (9-6 in conference play)

The **Lights** battled UGF for 40 minutes and secured a 59-53 win. Senior guard Tyler Chandler paced the Lights with 15 points while senior forward David Straughter chipped in 12 points. Northern improved to 20-7 overall (9-6 in the Frontier Conference).

## February 18

The No. 15 MSUN **Skylights** held off a fourth quarter charge by the Saints to beat Carroll College 54-45 (third win over the Saints this season) in Helena. Senior guard Natalee Faupel continued her dominant performance and led the Skylights in scoring with 16 points. Northern moved up to 10-6 in conference action (20-7 overall).

**Northern men** fell just eight points short (60-68) of upsetting the No. 8 Saints. Junior forward Ryan Reeves scored 15 points and pulled down seven rebounds. The loss dropped the Lights to 9-7 in conference play (20-8 overall).

No. 5 **MSU-Northern grapplers** placed 5th overall at the West National Qualifier in Redding, California. Three Lights wrestlers won individual championships: Senior Ben Stroh (184), senior Taylor Kornoely (HWT), and sophomore Brandon Weber (157). Also placing were sophomore Matt Weber (finished third at 141) and sophomore Drake Randall (finished fourth at 165). Stroh, Kornoely, and the Weber brothers secured automatic spots at the National tournament for finishing in the top three of their divisions. Randall joins the group as a national wildcard qualifier.

## February 24

In a matchup of two ranked teams, the No. 15 **Skylights** held off No. 20 Western Montana 57-53. Senior guard Natalee Faupel once again led the charge with 25 points and eight rebounds. Northern moves to 11-6 in the Frontier Conference (21-7 overall).

The Northern **Lights** fell to the No. 13 Bulldogs 66-76. Junior forward Ryan Reeves finished with 19 points and seven rebounds while senior forward David Straughter scored 16 points and pulled down seven boards. The loss moved the Lights conference record to 9-8 (20-9 overall)

## February 25

On an emotional senior night at the Armory Gymnasium, the No. 15 **Skylights** defeated Rocky Mountain College (53-49) for the first time this season. Again, senior guard Natalee Faupel led the charge with her 28 points and eight rebounds. Northern finished off the regular season with a 12-6 record (22-7 overall) and secured the second place finish giving them a first round bye in the conference tournament.

After honoring their four seniors, the **Lights** came up short against a scrappy Rocky Mountain College team 58-75. Senior David Straughter was the only Northern player to finish with double figures (13 points). The loss put the Lights and the Battlin' Bears in a tie for fourth place with both having a 9-9 conference record. However; the tiebreaker goes to Northern and the Lights will play host to RMC in first round conference tournament action on March 1.
