ASCE Students Participated in the 2023 Pacific Northwest Student Symposium



On April 14 and 15, the MSU-Northern student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) participated in the 2023 Pacific Northwest Student Symposium. The event was hosted jointly by the four Montana schools (Carroll College, MSU-Northern, MSU-Bozeman, Montana Tech) with an ASCE Student Chapter. The symposium took place at the Montana State University campus in snowy Bozeman, Montana.

The Symposium included student chapters located in Alaska, Arizona, British Columbia, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Washington. Fifteen universities participated in the various competitions such as Surveying, Concrete Canoe, Steel Bridge, Sustainable Solutions, and Timber Strong Design/Build.

The MSU-Northern students chose to leave their mark in the Surveying competition held on Friday. The four teams in this event completed five separate tasks in a three-hour time-period. The MSU-Northern ASCE Student Chapter members participating were Greg Rhines, Hadley Plummer, Trae Kennerly, and Adam Solberg. The MSU-Northern team performed well, with the highest score of all teams in the Sewer Staking event. They also achieved a perfect score in the Differential Leveling event and scored 90 out of 100 points in the Building Stakeout event. The MSU-Northern team fell short in the Pacing and Mapping events, but overall, represented the school well in the competition. The strength of the MSUN team was its ability to work together to overcome the challenges set before them at the symposium. The event

illuminated the student's exceptional problem solving, team building, and surveying skills.

During the Friday evening banquet, MSU-Northern Student Chapter President Hadley Plummer was presented an award for MSU-Northern's contributions in planning and co-hosting the competition. The keynote speaker at the dinner was Mack Long, the director of the Montanan Department of Transportation.

Teresa Brockie Helps Northern Understand Vulnerable Populations



Teresa Brockie, PhD, RN, FAAN, is an Assistant Professor at Johns Hopkins School of Nursing with a joint appointment in the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg Center for Indigenous Health. During her visit to campus this week (April 18), she met with the HTH 101 Opportunities in Health class and conducted a lunch lecture where she shared her personal and inspirational rags to riches story.

She also shared some of her research as an Indigenous nurse scientist and educator whose research focuses on achieving health equity through community-based prevention and intervention of suicide, trauma, and adverse childhood experiences among vulnerable populations. Her visit was sponsored by the Office of Diversity and Little River Institute at MSU-Northern.


Last Weekend for Havre Dinner Theatre

Northern Spotlight on Amy Smith



Aside from teaching, Dr. Amy L. Smith, education professor, has always had a love for animals. Upon moving to Havre, she sought out an opportunity to volunteer at a local animal shelter and was welcomed with open arms from PAWS of Chinook. "The team at PAWS was grateful for my inquiry to volunteer. They immediately put me to work walking dogs and cuddling puppies! Who could ask for a better way to spend a few hours on the weekend,"

said Smith.

Since starting volunteering at PAWS in January of 2022, Amy has helped the shelter care for and adopt out nearly 100 dogs and will continue to support PAWS' efforts to help stray and surrendered dogs as well as to support folks along the Hi Line that participate in vaccination and spay/neuter clinics offered to pet owners. PAWS was responsible for 357 spays/neuters and vaccinating 511 cats and dogs in one year; "I love being able to contribute to the positive impact on animal's lives and providing such services to the community."

A highlight of volunteering at PAWS is bringing puppies to campus for students (staff and faculty too) to de-stress a bit by loving on a puppy or two or three or six. "It is so fun seeing students melt when they are at the bottom of a dog pile!" While volunteering at PAWS brings Amy joy, she states that it is often heartbreaking, hard work but that is also the motivator to continue to help. The most rewarding part of volunteering at PAWS – "all of it; hanging out with the amazing people that run PAWS, knowing these dogs are going to find a good

home, seeing the gratitude from people that have participated in a clinic, simply just all of it."

Amy has three dogs of her own. Monk, her 'grumpy old man,' was rescued from a box on a street corner in Phoenix, AZ. Kairos, the Greek God of Opportunity, definitely took advantage of an opportunity when Amy discovered him in a bad situation about two hours north of Athens, Greece. Her most recent rescue is Tonka, who was found in a dumpster on the Ft. Belknap Reservation and taken to PAWS for care. "I have special bond with all of my boys; I think they know I helped them and now we are just trying to live our best life ever," said Smith.




