The committee will provide written rationale to the originator when a proposal is disapproved and the proposal is returned to the originator.
- 4. The Academic Senate considers the proposal and approves or disapproves. If approved, the proposal is forwarded to the Full Faculty for consideration. If the Academic Senate disapproves the proposal, the originator may request that the item be forwarded to the Full Faculty for consideration. The Academic Senate will provide written rationale to the originator when proposals are disapproved and the proposal is returned to the originator.
- 5. The Full Faculty considers Academic Senate approved proposals. If faculty approve, the proposal will then be forwarded to the Provost. The Provost approves or disapproves the proposal. If approved, the proposal is then forwarded to the Chancellor.
- 7. The Chancellor approves or disapproves the proposal.

I. Rationale: Suggestion by Will Rawn

- A. SS Broadfield fails to meet NCLB as currently written,
 - 1. not much good outside montana
 - 2. we need better program that gives students more content knowledge (even though SS Broadfield degree has been attracting more students recently).
 - 3. The time to act seems to be now, while we have at least conditional support from Cheri Gimeno not only for program change but for at least the minimum needed additional staffing such a new program might require.
 - 4. What we propose is not just adoption of the BA Degrees in Political Science and History with teaching options, but that the \(\mathbb{SS}\). Broadfield degree be eliminated.

sure the proposals meet PEP standards and we are convinced they provide sufficient background for students wishing to go on into Masters Programs

II. Structure of the 30 credit Pol Sci Degree

- A. We already have 18 credits of basic Political Science courses on the books, that would be standard in any good undergraduate POL SCI program.
- B. After consultation of catalogues in several colleges and universities, I suggest creation of 5 additional POL SCI courses, the most important of which would be a capstone course, Research & Writing in Political Science.
- C. The resulting program will be sort of a classical POL SCI degree, with
 - (a) 21 credits of required, specified courses including business statistics, plus 9 credits of options,

(b) some specialized focus

- -two courses on the U.S. Constitution and constitutional law -two courses on international relations and foreign policy (the foreign policy course will be cross listed HIST and POL SCI and will be an option in both degrees, which can be taken in only one)
- one course in Public Choice already on the books
- D. We think we can teach these two programs if we hire one additional faculty member capable of teaching in both the history and POL SCI fields.
