Chancellor Finalists to Visit Campus

The public will have an opportunity to meet four finalists interviewing to be the next chancellor of Montana State University-Northern during campus visits Nov. 7-10th.

The finalists were selected by an 18-member search committee from a national pool of more than 40 candidates who applied for the position. "We had an excellent pool of candidates and we've come up with four finalists that our students, faculty, staff and community members will be impressed with," said Joe Callahan, interim MSU-Northern chancellor and search committee co-chair.

During their campus visits, the candidates will meet with students, faculty, staff and the community. The public forums are open to everyone and will be held in the Hensler Auditorium in MSU-Northern's Applied Technology Center. The times for the public forums are as follows:

- James Limbaugh - Tuesday, November 8 at 5:15-6:15
- Paul Jones - Wednesday, November 9 at 5:15-6:15

"We welcome the community to meet the candidates at their public forums," Callahan said. "We're looking for someone who will not only make Northern a great place for our students, but who will also work with the community to help Havre prosper."

Lenny Klaver is currently a tenured faculty member in the Department of Health, Exercise Science and Sports Management at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside in Kenosha, Wis., a position he has held since 1996.

While at the University of Wisconsin, Klaver also served as vice chancellor for university relations and advancement from 2001 to 2010. From 1996 to 2001, he was the chair of the Department of Health, Exercise Science and Sports Management as well as the Director of Athletics.

From 1983 to 1996, Klaver was a tenured faculty member at Wayne State College, Wayne, Neb., the assistant athletic director and a coach.

Klaver earned an associate of arts degree from Iowa Central Community College in 1977. He has a bachelor's of arts and master's of science in education from Wayne State College. He holds a doctorate of education from the University of Northern Colorado.

James Limbaugh is currently vice president for strategy, planning and policy at Angelo State University in San Angelo, Texas, a position he has held since 2008. Previously, Limbaugh was the interim provost and vice president for academic and student affairs at Angelo State University from 2009 to 2010.

From 2007 to 2008, Limbaugh was the associate vice president for institutional effectiveness at Frostburg State University in Maryland. At Frostburg State, he also served as: assistant to the provost from 2002 to 2007; director of special academic services from 1995 to 2002; director of auxiliary services from 1984 to 1995; and associate dean of students from 1980 to 1984.

Prior to Frostburg State University, Limbaugh served as assistant director of the Memorial Student Union at the University of Nebraska-Kearney from 1976 to 1980.

Limbaugh earned a bachelor's of science in history from Frostburg State University and a bachelor's of arts in general business and English from Texas A&M University. He holds a master's of science in student personnel and guidance from Texas A&M and a doctorate of philosophy in educational policy and leadership from the University of Maryland.

Paul Jones is currently the vice president for administration and operations at Georgia College and State University in Milledgeville, Ga., a position he has held since 2010. He is also a professor of educational administration.

While at Georgia College, Jones has also served as the vice president and chief of staff from 2008 to 2010; vice president for institutional research and enrollment management from 2004 to 2008, and the associate vice president for enrollment services from 2002 to 2004.

Jones has also held a number of concurrent positions while at Georgia College including interim vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculties from 2009 to 2010; interim vice president for business and finance from March 2007 to August 2007; interim registrar from 2005 to 2006; interim director of institutional research from 2004 to 2005; and interim assistant to the president from 2003 to 2004.

From 1994 to 2002, Jones worked at Mesa State College in Grand Junction, Colo., where he held the position of dean of enrollment management from 1997 to 2002 and director of admissions from 1994 to 1997. From 1991 to 1994, Jones worked at Utah State University in Logan, Utah, as the director of multicultural student affairs from 1992 to 1994 and the associate director of high school-college relations from 1991 to 1992. From 1990 to 1991, Jones was the associate director of admission at Hood College in Frederick, Md.

Jones has a bachelor's of science in speech communication from Utah State University, a master's of social science in interdisciplinary studies from USU, and a doctorate of philosophy in education and human resource studies from Colorado State University.

Phillip Taylor III is currently the dean of science, liberal arts and business at Paul Smith's College in Adirondacks, N.Y., a position he has held since 2004. He is also a full professor.

From 1999 to 2004, Taylor worked at Glenville State College, in Glenville, W.Va., first as the founding director of the presidential scholars program from 2000 to 2004 and then as the chair of the division of arts and sciences from 2002 to 2004.

Taylor earned a double bachelor's of arts degree in chemistry and biochemistry from East Stroudsburg University in Pennsylvania, from which he also has a master's of science in biology. He holds a MBA and a doctorate in molecular and cellular biology from Ohio University, Athens, Ohio.

LRBP Meeting Discusses Priorities



This week a group of people from MSU-Bozeman, OCHE, and local legislatures met with several people from MSU-Northern to talk about the Long Range Building and Planning process. The group confirmed that renovating Hagener Science Center and building a new Auto/Diesel Technology Center were still the highest priorities for MSU-Northern.

Paul Tuss Appointed to Board of Regents

Governor Brian Schweitzer recently announced the appointment of Paul Tuss to the Board of Regents. Tuss will fill the vacancy on Board of Regents for remainder of Lynn Hamilton's term, which expires February 1, 2013. Hamilton resigned from the Board last month.

Paul Tuss, Havre, is the executive director of Bear Paw Development Corporation, a private, non-profit organization that administers regional economic development programs in Hill, Blaine, Liberty, Chouteau and Phillips Counties and the Fort Belknap and Rocky Boy's Indian Reservations.

He has a political science degree from the University of Montana and is a native of Anaconda. Tuss has held leadership posts in the Montana Economic Developers Association, the Montana Nonprofit Association, the Northern Montana Hospital and the UM Alumni Association among others. Tuss has been appointed to serve on state boards and commissions, including the Tourism Advisory Council, the Montana Heritage and Development Commission and the Judicial Nomination Commission under Governor Brian Schweitzer and the Economic Development Advisory Council under Governor Judy Martz. In 2009, he served as a Board of Regents' appointee to the MSU presidential search committee, which led to the hiring of Dr. Waded Cruzado.

Is Islam Really the Enemy?

"Islam and the West: Is Islam Really the Enemy?" will be the topic of a program at Northern's Hensler auditorium Thursday, November 10 at 7 p.m. Retired diplomat David Grimland will lead the free, public discussion, jointly sponsored by the Havre Hill County Library Foundation, MSU-Northern's College of Education, Arts and Sciences, and Nursing, and a Humanities Montana grant.

Grimland, who spent most of a thirty year U.S. diplomatic service career in Muslim Countries, and who now lives in Columbus has travelled the United States on what he describes as a mission to involve people in "seeing the world through Muslim eyes." He reports that he finds audiences are curious about Islam and that many people are interested in interfaith efforts to overcome stereotypes and find a common ground of religious understanding.

New Lights in the Gym



The MSU-Northern gym is getting new energy efficient lighting. Currently the illumination on the main court is 25 foot candles; the new lights will more than double the lighting, bringing it to a projected 52 foot candles. This will make it easier for our fans and players to see the action. This project's control strategy would also bring us into energy code compliance. This project is funded through the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act funds and Montana Department of Environmental Quality's State Buildings Energy Conservation Program.

New Boiler System in the Electronics Building

The new boiler project is funded through the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act funds and Montana Department of Environmental Quality's State Buildings Energy Conservation Program which replaced an older American Standard Scotch Marine boiler with low efficiency of 70% with an Aerco Benchmark condensing boiler with a 99% efficiency rating at a low fire rate of 5% and an 85% efficiency at high fire rate of 100% making this an extremely good energy conservation investment for MSU-Northern. Northern has done six similar projects recently which have resulted in reduction of our campus gas usage by one fifth of our former consumption just six years ago.

Word 2010 Tip

Use Word's no-width optional break character to help text wrapping

When a lengthy URL hits the right margin, Word treats the long text as a single word and wraps it to the next line, leaving a large gap at the right margin in the preceding line.

If you are having this issue with a URL, then the easiest way to resolve the problem would be to add a hyperlink to the existing text instead of displaying the actual full URL. But suppose you don't have that option. Fortunately, you can help Word break a long group of connected characters by inserting a "no-width optional break" (or several). You can't see the character(s), but Word reacts to one as if it were a space.

To insert this character, do the following:

1. Position the cursor where you want to insert the character. For instance, you might insert a character after each slash in a URL.
2. Click the **Insert** tab and click **Symbol** in the **Symbols** group.
3. Select **More Symbols** to launch the Symbol dialog box.
4. Click the **Special Characters** tab.
5. Scroll down and highlight No-Width Optional Break.
6. Click Insert.

You can't tell by looking at the URL that there's anything there, but there is. If you want to see the optional breaks, click the **Home** tab and then click **Show/Hide** symbol () in the **Paragraph** group. The optional breaks appear as small rectangles. Word uses these characters to break the URL at reasonable positions, and you control what those positions are. A URL is just an example. You can use this optional break character to break any type of connected text, not just URLs.
