Everyone is encouraged to attend and you can count your attendance as work time if you attend during your normal work time.

6th Annual Yuri's Night a Success



Human spaceflight became a reality 51 years ago with the launch of a bell-shaped capsule called "Vostok 1". The capsule was carrying Soviet Cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin, who took his place in history as the first human to leave the bounds of Earth and enter outer space. Thirty one years ago, the first STS Space Shuttle with Captain John Young as Commander of the flight was launched. To celebrate these anniversaries, MSU-Northern hosted the 6th annual "Yuri's Night".

Campus and community members flocked to this free event where pizza was served, the blow-up planetarium was available for viewing constellations, telescopes were set up for star-gazing, "Space Stuff Giveaways" were awarded, and the band "Blind Luck" performed throughout the evening. Climate Change



This week, Nobel Prize Winner, Steven Running, was on campus to talk about Global Warming and Climate Change. Running is a professor and director of Numerical Terradynamics Simulation Group in the College of Forestry and Conservation at the University of Montana in Missoula. Running is the sole Montanan on the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) in Geneva, Running was selected to join the panel in May 2004 and served as one of 600 authors for three different reports on climate change, including head author for the report "Climate Change 2007: Impacts, Adaptation and Vulnerability." Running's presentation was part of the MSU-Northern Chancellor's Lecture Series.

Skylights Volleyball New Recruits

Montana State University-Northern head volleyball coach Bill Huebsch continues to add to the Skylights Volleyball Team. Miranda Doing, a 5'11" middle blocker from La Mirada, CA, will be transferring from a college in Anchorage, AK. Doing also played volleyball at Pasadena City College. In high school, Doing was an All-CIF Division III selection as a senior. She played on two suburban league champion squads and saw her team reach the CIF semifinal appearances. Doing is a very involved student. She was a three-year letter-winner in high school, as well as being devoted in the classroom, and involved in various volunteer and community activities. Doing is studying health promotion.

Lewistown, MT native Erin Jensen will be joining the Skylights team as well. Jensen, a 5'8" hitter, won back-to-back Class A state championships with the Fergus High School Golden Eagles. She's also the sister of current Skylight player Dayna Jensen. Jensen is another high-achieving addition to our team. She received the Academic All-State award all four years of high school. Jensen also helped with multiple volleyball clinics for 5th and 6th grade students, and she coached at the Fergus summer camp. Jensen plans to major in nursing and looks forward to joining her sister and the Northern community.

Joining us from Cheyenne, WY is 6'0" outside hitter Abby Nicholas. This Sandy, UT native is transferring from Laramie County Community College to Northern in order to add her special skills to our volleyball team. In high school, Nicholas was the MVP her sophomore and junior years. During her senior year, she was recognized on the 1st Team All-Region team and received a 5A All-State Honorable Mention. Nicholas played for High Country Volleyball Club in Salt Lake City, and also led LCCC to many victories.

Nicholas believes that MSU-N will challenge her both on and off the court and is excited for the challenge.

MAT will be presenting their rendition of Scotland Road in the MSU-N theater in Cowan Hall on the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic- April the15th, with two special showings, one at 4 p.m. and one at 7 p.m. This anniversary celebration will be a semi-formal gala with hors d'oeuvres served at 5:30 p.m. MAT will present the play on the two weekends following the gala anniversary celebration. The regular season play dates, times, and admission costs are as follows: April 19-21 and 26-28. The doors and backstage lounge open at 7:30 p.m., with the play beginning at 8 p.m. each night. The cost is \$15 for adults, \$10 for students and seniors, and FREE for MSU-N students with current I.D.

Branding 101

What is message mapping and how does it help us fulfill our brand promise?

Message mapping is like a road map. It helps us determine where we are and what direction we need to go to arrive at our desired destination. For all practical purposes message mapping occurs on two levels. The first level, I will call the public level and it represents all of the messages we send to our publics. This is where most of the core messages are defined and communicated to the public through traditional promotional activities like brochures, advertisements, social media etc.

The second level I am calling the private level. The private level is where the rubber meets the road. This level is where people help people in such a way that they fulfill our brand promise. For example, let's say we adopt a vision statement that says we are going to be known for our "supportive, student-centered environment." When a student has a question we will be able to answer their question in a way that the student feels supported and wanted. They will also receive a consistent message from everyone at the college.

Looking for some resources for your speech or research paper? Try using the Library's catalog and databases to find books, magazine and journal articles. The Library offers you access to more than 237,000 print and electronic books. You can read 120 current print journals, magazines and newspapers. You also have access to an additional 28,000 full-text electronic journals, magazines, and newspapers, when you search through the 65 different databases to which the Library subscribes.

Even with all these resources, don't be surprised if you can't find that 1 perfect book or article that addresses every point that you want to make in your paper. As a student, it's up to you to evaluate the information that you have found in different resources and then write up your conclusions for your professor to read.

If you have any questions as to which database to search, visit with a Library staff member. You can

stop by the Circulation desk, call or send us an email.

Excel 2010 Tip

Copy an Excel sheet from one workbook to another

Here's another technique to copy an Excel sheet from one workbook to another. It's always great to know there's more than one way to do something.

- 1. Open your source and target workbooks
- Click the View tab and choose View Side By Side in the Window group. Excel will split the screen, horizontally, between the two workbooks. (Excel 2003: this option is on the Window menu)
- 3. To **move** a sheet: click the sheet tab in the source workbook and drag it to the target workbook.

To **copy** the sheet: hold down the **Ctrl** key while you drag the sheet to the target workbook.

That's all there is to it!

Note: Moving a sheet might have problems that show up later. If the sheet contains a procedure that references another sheet in the source workbook, Excel will do its best to find the source workbook. If it can't, you'll get errors when you run that procedure.
