MSU-Northern's new Chancellor, Dr. James M. Limbaugh welcomed the new students during Northern's Spring Semester New Student Orientation. Dr. Limbaugh was selected as Chancellor of Montana State University-Northern byMSU President Waded Cruzado and approved by the Montana Board of Regents in December 2011. Dr. Limbaugh officially took the reins on January 1, 2012. He and his wife Patricia came to Northern from San Angelo, Texas where Dr. Limbaugh served as Vice President for Strategy, Planning, and Policy at Angelo State University. Prior to that position, he was Provost and Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs. Dr. Limbaugh is an excellent addition to the "Northern Family".

THE PLANNING PROCESS

Since my arrival in Havre in late December, I have had the opportunity to meet and talk with faculty and staff, alumni, and members of the community. As these individual conversations turn to MSUN, a singular



theme ultimately surfaces: the need for a collaborative vision to guide MSUN's growth over the next several years, coupled with a planning process that makes the vision a reality.

Development of such a vision is my first priority. Next week, you will see announcements about the

"visioning exercise," a process of soliciting input from all quarters of the campus and the community at large. In a centralized setting, you will have the opportunity to record your thoughts about the future of MSUN over the next five to ten years. Using large display boards, you will be able to post your comments about all aspects of the university, from academic programs to student support services to facilities and infrastructure. You will also be able to reflect on the comments offered by other members of the campus community. Additionally, a section of the MSUN website will be identified to allow input from the community at large.

Comments collected with then be thematically analyzed and presented to the campus through existing governance structures and various forums. The themes that surface will then be massaged into a vision statement that will serve as a foundation for the planning process. My goal is to create, in full partnership with you and the broader community, a vision that we can all share and that can guide our future growth and development.

CELEBRATING OUR ACHIEVEMENTS THROUGH "POINTS OF PRIDE"

In the short amount of time that I have been on campus, I have learned that our students, faculty, and staff have recorded significant achievements in scholarship, public service, competitions, and outreach. Computer Corner

Word 2010 Tip

Emphasize a picture by changing its shape

An ordinary square picture plopped into a corner of a document is a rather boring. One way to emphasize a picture is to change its shape and Word makes it easy.

The first step is to insert the picture by clicking the Insert tab and clicking Picture in the Illustrations group. Locate the picture and click Insert. It doesn't matter where you insert it because you can easily move it.

With the picture in your Word document, you're ready to change its shape using the Crop Shape option as follows:

- 1. Click on the picture to select it.
- 2. On the **Picture Tools Format** tab, click the **Crop** drop down in the **Size** group.
- 3. Choose Crop To Shape and then click a shape to apply to the picture.

To position the picture within the text, you'll need to change a few properties-which properties depend on the results you want. Right click on the picture and select a Wrap Text option to change the layout.

Note: In Word 2010, if the Word document is a .doc file (compatibility mode), these options won't appear (there will be no drop-down on the Crop button). You'll need to save it as a .docx file to be able to do this.
