Veteran's Day Celebration

Overview of Program Review Prioritization

MSU-Northern has begun a process for the prioritization of its programs and disciplines. This process will be a faculty driven, multi-part assessment. The Academic Council has developed a framework to guide the reviews which has seven criteria: centrality, productivity, internal and external demand, quality, size and cost effectiveness. Each step of the prioritization project will be transparent and communicated to all constituents.

The "Program Review Prioritization" project will take about two-years to complete and will be carried out in three phases.

The first phase has already begun and will require the faculty to review their programs and disciplines. During this phase, faculty are encouraged to develop new programs to be considered. The second phase will prioritize all of the programs and the Academic Council, comprised of five faculty members and four administrators, will make a recommendation to Chancellor James Limbaugh to enact one of four actions on each program: grow, maintain, reduce /integrate, or eliminate based on observations, research, and evidence offered by those involved with each program. During the third phase, all program or discipline revisions will be submitted to MSU-Bozeman, OCHE the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education, and the Board of Regents for approval. The university's goal is that all new programs will be ready to enroll students by fall 2014.

In Prioritizing Academic Programs and Services (2010), Dr. Robert C. Dickeson states, "Most institutions can no longer afford to be what they've become." MSUN has very few new resources available for investment in strategic priorities; the university must use existing resources in the most efficient manner possible. In order to increase the efficient use of our limited resources, the Academic Council, with input from the Academic Senate, will prioritize programs and place them on a continuum from investment (grow) to phase-out. This prioritizing process will create a roadmap for growth and reallocation over the coming years.

MSU-Northern Chancellor's Lecture series presents author, photographer, and researcher Ms. Kae Cheatham of Helena, Montana. Entitled "Native People's Histories and Customs", Ms. Cheatham will present early American Indian life in the Northern Rockies. Cheatham will talk about those centuries before the horse, give details about the size of lodges, village layout, and the use of dogs as draft animals, an discuss how and why people traveled and hunting procedures. Throughout the program, Cheatham will stress the resourcefulness of the region's first immigrants, and encourages people to re-think how ancient cultures are perceived and the importance of this history.

Cheatham is the author of several books: Hammer Come Down, Child of the Mist, Dead Heroes, The Adventures of Elizabeth Fortune, Blood and

Office 2010 Tip

Put the Recent Documents list to work for you

The **Recent Documents** list in Office programs offers an easy way to manage the documents you're currently working on. Unfortunately, most users fail to take full advantage of it. We'll look at a few ways to put this list to work for you.

When you want to open an Office document, you have a choice: you can use File --> Open and work through the hierarchy of folders and files until you find the file you want to open... or you can use the **Recent Documents** list. There are a number of ways to access this list:

- If you have an Office document open, click the **File** tab and then click **Recent** in the left pane. Accessing the list this way also shows you where the documents are located a great way to find documents that were saved to the wrong folder.
- When you open Office programs from the Start menu the recent documents list "flies out" when you hover over the program name.
- If you already have a document open, you can right click on its icon that is on the **Task Bar** and the recent documents list will display.

To open a document, click it. To remove a document from the list, right-click it and choose **Remove**From List.

Pinning a document to the list makes it a permanent item in the list. Permanent items are displayed at the top of the recent documents list. This gains you quick access to the documents you use frequently just click the little push pin displayed to the right of the document name. (When accessing the list from the start menu or taskbar, the pushpin is displayed when you hover over a document in the list)

You can also change the number of files listed on the recent page of a program (it doesn't affect the lists displayed from the Start menu or Task Bar):

- 1. Click the **File** tab and choose **Options** in the left pane.
- 2. Select **Advanced** in the left pane.
- 3. In the **Display** section, enter the appropriate number in the **Show This Number Of Recent Documents** option. If you choose 0, you disable the feature and Word will remove all items from the list.
- 1. Click OK.
