From the Chancellor

At the September Board of Regents' meeting, the overall tone of the Board meeting was one of innovation-an explicit expectation that each campus reconsider the way it approaches education in the 21st century. During this session, MSUN received plaudits-both publicly and privately-from the Commissioner's office, the Board of Regents, and the leadership of Montana State University-Bozeman for our initiatives to upgrade the campus, to revitalize our website, and to review our academic programs. To engage in thoughtful, collaborative discussions about new educational initiatives for our students within such an atmosphere of enthusiastic support is an unparalleled opportunity for the faculty and for the entire campus. In the coming year and throughout our discussion, I ask that we focus on creativity of thought and the use of data to inform our decision-making process in support of our overarching goal of student success.

This is a great time to be at MSUN.

Northern's Enrollment Up

MSU-Northern's enrollment is up nine students (1282 headcount) as compared to this time last year's (1273 headcount). We are also up 3.15 FTE (full-time equivalent) students.

Dr. James Limbaugh, Chancellor, explains, "I am very privileged to have a dedicated group of faculty and staff who have worked very hard to make this enrollment increase a reality. When I came to Northern nine months ago I told everyone our enrollment will be up by the fall of 2013. I am pleased we have achieved that goal a year early, and my overarching goal is for that trend to continue."

American Indian Heritage Day Celebration



MSU-Northern celebrated American Indian Heritage Day with a Tipi Raising ceremony which was presented by Mr. Merle Tendoy, tribal elder at Rocky Boy. The ceremony involved a blessing of the new MSU-Northern Tipi lodge, and a smudge ceremony. The buffalo sage used for the ceremony is universal to North American tribes for the purpose of cleansing, purification and the banishment of negative spirits during a ceremony. Mr. Tendoy also shared the history of the tipi and its significance to the Native American people.

Northern Showcase Season Begins

James Lee Stanley

The Northern Showcase Concert Association is proud to present as their season opener "James Lee Stanley" on October 9, 2012 at 7:30 p.m. in the MSU-Northern SUB Ballroom. Stanley, a true renaissance man, was born into a musical family in Philadelphia, PA., and was already performing and recording for LeGrand Records by the time he was fourteen. He majored in music at California State University, did a stint in the Air Force as a Chinese linguist, and performed three hundred dates a year with such diverse acts as Bonnie Raitt, Robin Williams, Chick Corea & Return To Forever, and Bill Cosby by the time he landed his second recording contract.

His remarkable ability as a vocalist and composer allow him to create songs, each recorded with a finely crafted backing that sonically enhances the impulse behind the lyric, coupled with his outrageously hilarious repartee. He is one of the few all-time greats and undisputed geniuses among singer-songwriters. FI Magazine listed his "Freelance Human Being" as "one of the finest recordings of 1998 and one of the Top 200 Recordings of all time." -FI Magazine-March 1999

"So where have they been hiding James Lee Stanley? We could say that James Lee Stanley is probably the last great undiscovered singer-songwriter in America. But true as that may be, let's say something else. Let's say that a diamond has been smuggled into the wasteland.....and here is where the wasteland ends." - Tom Robbins, author of "Even Cowgirls Get the Blues"

There are two wonderful opportunities for students, faculty, staff, and community members to expand their horizons with overseas travel in 2013.

First, over spring break, March 10-18, a group is leaving from Great Falls and heading to explore Ireland with an escorted tour. The trip starts in Shannon/Killarney then heads south to the Ring of Kerry, east to Blarney and Cork, then north to Dublin where they will experience St. Patrick's Day. The second opportunity is to Turkey. Brenda Skornogoski is the group leader. The group leaves Great Falls May the 14th for a 13-day adventure that circumnavigates Turkey. The tour starts in Istanbul, continues through Troy to Izmir (also known as Smyrna) with an optional side trip to Ephesus and the last home of Mary of Nazareth. The trip continues to Anatalya which is located on the Mediterranean Sea. This area is referred to as the "Turquoise Coast". From there the tour goes to Cappadocia which is an area similar to our "Badlands" with very unique building structure - sort of like our local "hoodoos". The tour continues through the capital of Ankar and then back to Istanbul. Computer Corner

Windows 7 Tip

Set a New Windows Explorer Launch Folder

When you run Windows Explorer, it always opens to the Libraries folder. That's fine if you use Microsoft's default file organization, which designates Libraries as the overall container for your folders. But what if you don't? You might prefer to have Windows Explorer open to Computer or any other folder you choose. Here's how to do it:

- 1. Right-click the Windows Explorer icon on the taskbar (it's the one that looks like a folder).
- 2. On the context menu that appears, right-click the **Windows Explorer** icon.
- 3. Select **Properties**. The **Windows Explorer Properties** dialog box appears.
- 4. You'll have to edit the **Target** field on the Shortcut tab of this dialog box in order to change the default location at which Explorer opens.

If you want Explorer to open to a specific folder, simply enter the name of the folder, substituting your folder name for "Folder" in this example:

%windir%\explorer.exe c:\Folder

So let's say you have a folder called **Budget** on your C: drive. To have Explorer open to that folder you would type this in the Target field:

%windir%\explorer.exe c:\Budget

If you want Explorer to open to special pre-set locations, such as **Computer**, you'll need to enter special syntax in the **Target** field. Following is a list of three common locations and the syntax to use:

Computer: %windir%\explorer.exe ::{20D04FE0-3AEA-1069-A2D8-08002B30309D} Documents: %windir%\explorer.exe ::{450D8FBA-AD25-11D0-98A8-0800361B1103} Network: %windir%\explorer.exe ::{208D2C60-3AEA-1069-A2D7-08002B30309D}

5. After you've changed the **Target** field, click **OK**. Next time you launch Windows Explorer, it will open to the new location you've designated.
