

From the Chancellor

As part of our <u>focus on student success</u>, Montana State University-Northern has retained the services of <u>Noel-Levitz</u>, a national consulting firm specializing in higher education, to work with us on two specific projects: recruitment/admissions and retention. In the second of his six visits to campus, Dr. Charles Schroeder, the former vice president for student affairs at Georgia Tech and our retention consultant, reported on his work with several members of the campus community via focus groups and through the newly-formed Student Success Improvement Team. Based on these campus dialogues and on data provided by the university, Dr. Schroeder has recommended five strategies to serve as the focal points for our retention efforts:

- Helping students better understand their financial responsibilities;
- Establishing a robust learning communities program;
- Designing integrated performance support systems that improve academic and social success;
- Enhancing advising processes; and
- Creating an ethics of service excellence throughout the campus.

Additionally, as part of his first report, Dr. Schroeder cited as a significant factor contributing to MSUN's efforts to improve its retention programs the "hard-working and committed faculty and staff, many of whom attended MSUN as undergraduates and feel a deep and abiding loyalty to the university."

I will continue to keep you abreast of our continued work in retention, as well as the work of our consultants guiding our review of the admissions/recruitment process.

@ Your Library

This week let's look at education resources available at the Vande Bogart Library. For the future education professional, "ERIC", "Educator's Reference Complete", and the "Teacher Reference Center" are good sources of articles. Here you will find information on most educational topics. Are you an elementary education student looking for ideas to use in the classroom? Take a look at the "Mailbox" magazine. Issues of "Mailbox" can be read in and checked out from the library. Preparing to take the PRAXIS exam? The "Testing & Education Reference Center" database includes sample PRAXIS tests and online prep books. Additional print PRAXIS study guides can be checked out from the library. The library also has hundreds of education books that discuss educational theories, classroom management, ideas to use in the classroom, bulletin board ideas and many other topics. If you are a parent with children who let you know at the last minute that they have to write a paper, find a picture of something, or share some information with their class-don't panic! Take a look at "Kids Search" (K-8), "Searchasaurus" (K-3), or the "Student Research Center" (8-12). These databases are designed with child friendly search screens and retrieve age appropriate information. And as a parent, you can feel safe in letting your child use these databases. These databases are much safer and easier to use than doing Google searches! And remember, you can access these databases at home, regardless of the time! Word 2010 Tip

Annoying automatic changes... and how to turn them off

Last week we talked about how to undo automatic changes that Word makes as you type. This week I'll tell you how to disable the AutoCorrect features you don't want. To get to the AutoCorrect settings:

- 1. Click the File tab then Options (it's almost at the bottom of the list, above Exit)
- 2. Select **Proofing** from the left-hand menu.
- 3. Click the AutoCorrect Options button at the top of the window,
- 4. Then click on the AutoFormat As You Type tab.

5. Select or clear the check boxes for the options that you want to enable or disable.

When you're done, click the **Ok** buttons to exit.

A Pinch of Salt

For our "learn something new" topic this week, let's address the idea of learning a new language. Now it may seem daunting at first, but with how culturally diverse our country is becoming and how easy travel has become, learning a new language has never been a better idea. I've heard that full language immersion is the quickest way to force yourself to adapt to a new language, but since not too many of us can drop all we're doing to spend a couple months in a foreign country, here are some plausible alternatives:

- Save up some cash and invest in the Rosetta Stone program of your choice. The sets are generally pretty expensive, but the company has had recurring positive results for many years.
- Take a much cheaper route be checking out the free online flashcard system at www.learnalanguage.com.
- The website "thedailymuse.com" gives 5 fun ways to learn a new language. They are: 1. Learn as if you're really young by using the most basic children's materials that break down the language in "chewable" portions. 2. Watch movies in the language you're trying to learn. It'll help your fluidity so you can avoid sounding choppy and robotic. 3. Shop in an area where people will speak the language. This would be a hard one for Montanans, but it is still an option. 4. Use all sorts of technology and apps to help you learn like a local. 5. Speak the new language as much as you can. It helps if you have someone to talk to who is also learning or can already speak the language. Repetition will help solidify your pronunciation and confidence.
