Extended University Hires New Curriculum Developer



Her research has focused on German language and culture as well as pedagogy and workforce alignment in education. She also spent a year in Berlin as a Fulbright Research

Grant recipient, where she was able to tour technical schools and observe how the German education system structures curricula and apprenticeships to ensure workforce alignment. Artist of the Month - Kris Shaw with "Yellow Hat"



For February, Black History Month, the Office of Diversity Awareness and Multicultural Programs has invited local artist Kris Shaw with her piece "Yellow Hat."

This is a watercolor in terracotta tones in an image size of 13" by 19 1/2" and 19 1/2" by 26" (matted). Shaw describes this piece as an androgynous African-American individual, who "might represent a girl or a boy." That is the beauty of art: everyone can decided on his/her own meaning." Some commented that the piece depicts a beautiful tribal woman. Shaw adds, "it is a matter of looking into the eyes, and see if one can find a deeper meaning. That is the connection that people might get thorough art." She also interprets her creation as someone who "sticks their neck out" to help others.

Shaw added that the process of creating this piece was peculiar as she gradually was discovering how the final work was going to look like not having a pre-conception. Most recently, Shaw has been experimenting with ledger art and for those purposes, she has been using old music sheets of melodies she learned to play years ago (she plays violin and mandolin, in addition to singing).

Student Excellence Award Nominations Due- Feb. 26

The Student Excellence Award is Northern's most prestigious student award. It's time to nominate the students who have truly been shining Northern Lights this year. The deadline for nominations is: 5 p.m., Friday, February 26, 2016.

Undergraduate Nomination Criteria (up to 10 recipients):

- Nominees should demonstrate a commitment to educational goals through academic achievement and participation in extracurricular activities
- Any current student who will have earned the equivalent of 60 semester credits by the end of the spring 2016 semester, and was enrolled at MSU-Northern for fall 2015 semester, is eligible.
- The nominee must have a cumulative grade point average of 2.75.

Graduate Student Criteria (1 recipient):

- Nominees should demonstrate a commitment to educational goals through the academic achievement and participation in extracurricular activities, including demonstration of leadership in their work setting and/or community.
- Any current graduate student who will have earned the equivalent of 50 percent of the graduate program's credits by the end of the spring 2016 semester and was enrolled at MSU-Northern for fall 2015 semester, is eligible.
- The nominee must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.00.

FROM THE CAREER CENTER

The Montana State University-Northern Spring 2016 Career Fair is set for Monday, February 8th and will be held in the MSU-Northern Armory Gymnasium from 9am - Noon. The Career Fair is open to registered employers, all currently enrolled MSU-Northern students and alumni seeking various job opportunities. There will be employers interested in students from every academic program offered at MSU-Northern. This event will give Northern students and alumni the chance to meet with employers from all over the United States. The Spring Career Fair is closed to employer registration now with 40 employers registered.

Every Career Fair, employers have an opportunity to become one of the two Gold Level Sponsors of the event. The higher registration cost entitles them to receive a larger front table set-up at the Fair, a full page color ad in the Student Guide and some advertising perks on and off campus. The Spring 2016 Career Fair Gold Sponsors are GE Transportation of Havre and Wartsila of Fort Lauderdale, Florida. There are also four Maroon Level Sponsors for this event; Frontier Electric from Clancy, Montana; Mountain View Coop of Great Falls, Montana; Northern Rockies Medical Center of Cut Bank, Montana; and Torgersons LLC of Great Falls, Montana. These Maroon Level Sponsors receive tables near the front of the Gym, a half-page black and white ad in the Student Guide and advertising.

Most of the companies attending the event are from Montana, however many of them have job opportunities out-of-state. The Armory Gym will also see many new employers including the Havre Police Department, Montana Rail Link, and RJS & Associates from the Rocky Boy Reservation. Joining the new employers will be representatives from local businesses including Tilleman Motor Company, Northern Montana Health Care, Rural Employment Opportunities, and USDA Montana Farm Service Agency.

Havre will see an increase in traffic the week of February 8 with some companies arriving at the airport as well as others driving into town the day before. The Fair is only held the one day, but many employers will stay the afternoon and on Tuesday to conduct interviews with enrolled students and alumni for various internship and fulltime employment opportunities. Students and alumni interested in finding out which companies are interviewing and when the interview times are can log onto their CareerExpress account or contact the Career Center for more information.

All currently enrolled MSU-N students and alumni are welcome to attend the event and sign up for oncampus interviews. They will need to have a profile, with an edited resume, on the University's on-line career system called CareerExpress and are encouraged to register early for the Fair on that site.
