Andrew Rolin Named Head Football Coach

During the break, Andrew Rolin was named Northern's new Head Football Coach. He has been working tirelessly to assess his team and recruit the best players in the state.

Rolin was a former University of San Diego quarterback who was coached under former head coach Jim Harbaugh. He was an assistant coach at San Jose State University, the University of Washington, and the University of San Diego. He has coached several award-winning players including: Tyler Ervin, Shane Smith, Tim Crawley, and Kenn James. Ervin and Smith are currently playing for the Texans and Giants, respectfully. Rolin graduated from the University of San Diego with a Bachelor of Business Administration with a Management focus in 2009.

"I am very excited for this opportunity to lead the Northern Football Program," said Andrew Rolin. "I think you have to create a culture of winning," he said, "and that starts with the details, the little things, day-to-day. I plan to set a high standard in everything we do, on the football field, academically, and in the community. When you do that, the scoreboard will take care of itself and we will be successful," said Rolin.

"I have four goals for our team as a head coach," Rolin said. "Graduate, beat our rival, win the Frontier Conference, and win a national championship. And I can tell you that we'll do everything we can, every single day to achieve those goals. "

Student Surveys Helps Improve Campus Life

In the student life survey taken during the Spring Semester of 2017, students clearly indicated that they would benefit from the Food Court hours being extended until 8:00 p.m. This fall the Food Court hours were changed to 8:00 p.m. and that has proven to be very helpful to students. In that same survey, students indicated that they wanted new mattresses for the residence halls. Therefore, the Dean of Students, Steve Wise, brought in three mattresses for students to test and vote for their favorite mattress. The winning mattress resulted in the campus ordering 250 mattresses. Those mattresses have arrived on campus and will be distributed this next week.

This fall the students took another survey and they were asked if they would like to be able to purchase food on campus after 8:00 p.m. 87% of students responded "agree" or "agree strongly". These results only confirmed what the administration believed to be true.

MSU-Northern's student senate had been working on a proposal to add a grille in the Pin 'N Cue. Student Life happily collaborated with them to move this project forward. This is a good example of the great partnerships between student government and university administration. It is also a good example of the work ASMSU-N is doing on behalf of MSU-Northern students. They had planned for the grille to be functional at the start of this semester but the flooding of last week has slowed the progress. All equipment has been delivered and is waiting installation. An optimistic but fair goal would be to have the grille open and running by February 1.

The initial menu will include hamburgers, hotdogs, pizza, fountain drinks, and an assortment of chips. The administration is working on making it possible for students to make food purchases at the grille and for those purchases to count against their food plan. The details to make that possible are not in place yet.

KNMC Receives Grant to Start Community Events Calendar

Stormy Duvall the Artist of the Month at MSUN



Journey to the After Life

To begin spring semester 2018, the artist of the month is Stormy Duvall. Duvall introduces us to her artwork through the piece titled "Journey to the After Life." (Drawing, 8 X 10). There are three primary themes that emerge in the creations of Duvall: horses, veteran scenes, and Native American artifacts (since Stormy has Apache background). Duvall was raised in ranch life and has profound respect and admiration for our veterans. In her view, veterans should not just be recognized in November, but they should receive expressions of our admiration all year long. Duvall primarily likes to draw with inexpensive materials. She also makes tattoo designs. This piece

"Journey to the After Life" is dedicated to one of her cousins, who served several tours overseas in the military, but half of his company didn't make it home on the last tour (his company lost men and women of all colors). When he was having a tough time on Veteran's Day, Duvall thought maybe she could cheer him up by drawing this piece.

Duvall applied to join the military when she was in high school, but wasn't admitted due to an injury. She says that she tries very hard to thank our veterans and service members for all they do, "they risk everything, so we can stay safe here. Unfortunately, many of them come back to no homes, no income, and many of them suffer from PTSD, anxiety, and survivors' guilt. I refuse to charge a veteran for any tattoo or artwork because it is the least I can do to say thank you." She concludes that she enjoys designing military pieces because it lets her feel like in some way maybe a veteran will see how much she appreciates what they do for all of us.

Making Struggle Count: Lessons from the Civil Rights Movement for Today

During this lecture, participants will learn how the strategies and tactics from the Civil Rights era offer essential lessons for today's world. This lecture offers an introduction to the nonviolence theory, illustrative stories from civil rights era successes and failures, and civil rights era debates about the role of armed self-defense. Based on the presenter's 30 years of research into, writing about, and involvement in social change movements, the session will combine theory, practice, and inspiring narratives.

This presentation is by Dr. Tobin Miller Shearer, the director of African-American Studies at the University of Montana where he is also an Associate Professor of History. His most recent book is Two Weeks Every Summer: Fresh Air Children and the Problem of Race in America (Cornell University Press: 2017). He is a frequent writer, speaker, and commentator on historical and contemporary issues of race, religion, and the civil rights movement.
