# Donaldson Hall Nominated for the National Historical Registry



The Montana State Historic Preservation Office has nominated Donaldson Hall to be one of the five properties in Montana to be add the National Register of Historic Places. It is being recommended because it stands as an example of the Depression-era Public Works Administration program and was designed by prominent Havre architect Frank Bossuot. The National Register of Historic Places is the nation's official list of those cultural resources deemed worthy of preservation. Authorized under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Register includes districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that are significant in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, and culture. There are 1,971 places in Montana on the national register, 17 of which are in Havre.

Donaldson Hall was built in the 30's and was the third building on the campus of Northern Montana College. It was the girls' residence hall and was named Donaldson Hall in 1949 in honor of a deceased NMC English instructor. Constructed atop the hill just north and west of Pershing Hall, the building occupied a dominant position on campus. It was designed and constructed under a Public Works Administration self-liquidating load fund. Furnished and occupied in 1936, it provided rooms for 116 women, and was a social and elegant setting for college dances and receptions.


The building cost \$178,398.08. It was the first actual new building on campus. Poor materials and construction methods caused problems with the building almost from the beginning. After construction of a new residence hall in 1971, Donaldson Hall was unused for residence space. The lower floors were rented to School District 16 A and other organizations. Today, Donaldson Hall is unoccupied, but has a recently renovated space on the first floor known as the Donaldson Commons where receptions and meetings can be held.

for you and if you are understanding the material


- I like how small the classes are, so the professor really gets to know you and understand how you like to learn.

# **MSU-Northern Faculty and Staff Participate in Active Shooter Course**

On Monday, (Feb. 12) MSU-Northern presented The Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) and Stop the Bleed Trainings sessions for staff and faculty. They were taught by Dr. Frank Zuccala who is an assistant professor at Northern a Senior Patrolman with Cut Bank PD. The other instructor was Reserve Police Officer Niall Atkinson from Deer Lodge PD. Both are certified instructors of the CRASE material.

Pat Blankenship was one of the participants of these workshops and had this to say about the training:

"Dr. Frank Zuccala's Crisis Training and Stop the Bleed Courses were great. He is so well trained and experienced. I could listen to him all day. It's been 5 years since I have been to a training like this, and it was very different from the past. I recommend everyone should attend his courses. He gave lots of ideas, statistics, and a website to report a crime to the FBI: IC3.gov. He also went over how to react to a shooter or act of terrorism on campus. There were no live gun simulations so that was nice. Also, the Stop the Bleed Course was wonderful as well. He taught us what to do to the stop bleeding on a gunshot victim, car accident, ranching accident, stabbing, etc. that may increase the victims' chances of survival."

### **Come Celebrate National TRIO Day**



February 24, 2024 is National TRIO Day celebrating and raising awareness about the importance of educational opportunities for low-income and first-generation college students. Since that date falls on a Saturday, SSS will be honoring that day on Wednesday with refreshments in the SSS office.

Student Support Services (SSS) and Veterans Upward Bound (VUB) are both TRIO programs sponsored by Montana State University-Northern. VUB serves the entire state of Montana. SSS is located in Cowan Hall on the Northern Campus and has been making a difference in the lives of students since 1972. Student Support Services is a grant-funded program that aims to help MSU-Northern students achieve and maintain good academic standing and graduate on time with a bachelor's degree. Two hundred and forty students can be enrolled in the program.

The purpose of the SSS Program is to increase participants' retention, good academic standing, and graduation rates. Major components of the program include Academic Advising and Assistance in Course Selection, Early

Interventions, Academic Tutoring, Academic Study Skills, Access to Technology and Textbooks, Career Development and Exploration, Financial Aid and Literacy Counseling, Securing Housing, Leadership Development and Engagement, and Grant Aid Awards. SSS staff offer both space and services for enrolled students. The staff spend their days being as helpful as possible to students, faculty, and staff of Northern.



### (#406) Dr. Randy Bachmeier

This week's TibBit is going to highlight Northern Alumni and current Northern faculty member, Dr. Randy Bachmeir! Dr. Bachmeier graduated from Northern in 1993 with a Bachelor of Arts – Multi-/Interdisciplinary Studies, History and English,

2001 with a Bachelor of Arts – Multi-/Interdisciplinary Studies, Business (Accounting and Finance) and in in 2004 Master of Science in Education, Learning and Development. In 2009 Dr. Bachmeier received his Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) in Educational Psychology form Regent University.

Dr. Bachmeier has been employed at MSU-Northern for 22 years, during which time he held the positions of Project Coordinator (Community Technology Education Center), Director (The Learning Center and Online Learning), Dean for Extended University and currently as Assistant Professor in the Community Leadership program.

While a student at Northern, Dr. Bachmeier and his wife Christine spent time as the Managers of the Student Family Housing complex on the eastern most edge of the campus.

Prior to earning his Ed.D. and coming back to work at Northern, Dr. Randy Bachmeier was a reporter for The Daily News (Havre Daily News). The article that I remember more than any other was the one in the May 6, 1994, edition of The Daily News. The article was titled "The Last for NMC". This article summarizes the very last graduation for Northern Montana College, prior to becoming MSU-Northern. Here is that article.

#### Class of 1994 ends NMC graduations

The embers of the last graduating class of Northern Montana College, before the institution becomes their diplomas Saturday. And ironically, a memorial service on Monday, May 9, will mark the passing of Northern's very first graduate.

At 10 a.m. tomorrow in the gymnasium, more than 300 gradu-

In 1931, Ophus was the first member of NMC's first graduating class to receive a diploma, since her maiden name, Almos, was the first in the alphabet. She married Burton Ophus of Big


