Brown Bag Lecture Explored Ranked Choice Voting



Dr. Casey Donoven, who teaches MSU-Northern's Contemporary Mathematics (M105) course, presented a Brown Bag Lecture on the benefits and pitfalls of ranked choice voting. The general education class introduces students to less common math topics with practical applications, including logic and social choice theory.

During the lecture, Donoven outlined four different methods of ranked choice voting and explained how they differ. He also highlighted the work of Nobel Prize—winning economist and mathematician Kenneth Arrow, whose research examined the fairness of voting systems.

MSU-Northern Joins System-Wide Al Workshop





The Constitution established the framework of the federal government, outlining the separation of powers, checks and balances, and the rights of citizens. More than two centuries later, it remains the cornerstone of American democracy.

11th Annual Suicide Awareness Walk







(#440) Remembering Lanny Wilke

Two years ago, on June 22, 2023, Northern lost a dear community member, Mr. Lanny Wilke! In memory of our friend, colleague, teacher, mentor, and scone booth extraordinaire, funds had been requested to purchase a tree and a plaque. Earlier this year, we had secured the funds to get the tree from Frontier Lawn and

Landscaping and a plaque from J.M. Donovan Designs.

Both of these businesses are owned and operated by Northern Alumni. In July of this year, the MSU-Northern Physical Plant staff were able to get it set. This tree and plaque are situated on the northwest corner of the Brockmann Center, adjacent to the northeast of the Armory Gymnasium complex. This specific location was selected as these buildings were two of the places that Lanny had spent many hours over the past three decades.



A Northern Alum, Lanny Wilke, taught at Northern for 27 years. During that time, he had a lifelong impact on many who crossed his path. Throughout a person's life, they cross paths with many others, but certain ones leave a lasting impact like very few others. Lanny Wilkie was one of those.

Here is a quote from one of his former students, Tara Townsend, that sums up Lanny Wilkie!

"Mr. Wilkie One if the only reasons I passed college the second time with an infant and toddler in tow. Always a smile. Always a "it's okay, this can wait, your child cannot". Midnight emails after I finally rocked a sick one to sleep and the first for a hug when I grabbed my diploma. He never let a day go by he didn't tell me how proud of me he was and worked with me through some of my hardest times when I returned to college.

He was a huge proponent in cancer research and appropriating funds the correct way through organizations who funded treatment centers and never let a waiting child or St. Jude's Children's Hospital go without his support.

He was what I hope and wish to be to children and young adults who need a pat on the back and a boost of encouragement each and every day. He loved big. He smiled bigger.

He'll be greatly missed."

Tara is just one of many former Northern students who have expressed similar sentiments.
