### Student Spotlight - Dante Otsuka



When Dante Otsuka first searched online for diesel programs with a four-year degree, one school stood out: Montana State University-Northern. Originally from Walnut Creek, California, Dante packed his bags and headed north, eager to work with his hands and start a new chapter away from home.

"I did almost no research before coming here," he said with a laugh. "All I knew was Northern had a diesel program and I wanted to learn how to fix trucks."

That decision proved to be the right one. Now a junior majoring in Diesel Technology Field Maintenance, Dante says his experience at Northern has far exceeded expectations. He credits the program's hands-on approach and


small class sizes for helping him grow from a student with little experience to a confident, skilled mechanic.

Through classes like Advanced Fuel Systems and live work around Havre, Dante has gained real-world experience diagnosing and repairing heavy equipment, including a Komatsu dozer at the fairgrounds and a city school bus. He's also spent his summers interning with RDO Equipment, where he's worked his way from the parts department to performing complex repairs like replacing engines, transmissions, and welding excavator components. "Northern really builds your skills step by step," Dante said. "Now I can diagnose just about any issue on a machine."

Outside the classroom, Dante is an active member of the Postsecondary Agricultural Students (PAS) Club, where he's helped local farmers and ranchers, cut firewood for fundraisers, and gained a deep appreciation for Montana's rural lifestyle. He also volunteers at the Bear Paw Ski Hill, maintaining the chair lift and clearing runs before ski season.

Looking ahead, Dante plans to continue working for RDO Equipment as a logging mechanic after graduating in May 2026. His goal is to run his own service truck and serve as a professional role model for future mechanics.

"Northern is unique," he said. "It's a small, tight-knit community where you get to know your classmates, professors, and even the locals. I'm really glad I chose to come here — I don't think I'd have had these same experiences anywhere else."



### **AI, IRL: Campus Edition**

Walk across Northern and you're already using Al—often without noticing. Google Maps predicts your ETA around Havre; Siri, Alexa, and Gemini answer quick questions; streaming apps queue up your next playlist; and social platforms sort what you see.

Even campus systems—like the new key-fob access—may flag unusual swipe patterns to keep buildings safe. In study spaces and classrooms, AI shows up as grammar and style suggestions in Grammarly, paraphrasing and citation help in QuillBot, and note-organizing support in Google NotebookLM. Library catalogs and some databases now have AI embedded in them to recommend related articles, quietly bringing forward resources that match your topic.

If you do turn to chatbots, pick the right tool for the job. ChatGPT is the "jack of all trades" for brainstorming, outlining, plain-language explanations, email drafts, quizzing, and practice problems. Claude (Anthropic) shines with long readings—paste big chunks or upload documents to get summaries, side-by-side comparisons, and gentle, step-by-step explanations (great for lit reviews and unit plans). Microsoft Copilot and Google Gemini are productivity specialists: Copilot works inside Word, PowerPoint, and OneNote to draft slides or reorganize documents; Gemini pairs naturally with Docs and Slides to structure decks, rewrite for clarity, or suggest visuals and talking points. For research-style questions, Perplexity acts like an "answer engine," returning concise responses with source links—handy for scoping a topic (but always click through and evaluate the sources yourself).

There are some smart ways to use these tools in courses or teaching: Process help: "Create a search strategy and list keywords for this research question."

Structure: outlines, study guides, and rubrics.

Translation: turn dense text into bullet points, flowcharts, or plain language. In writing, always ask the model/Al to *explain* its suggestions (don't just accept rewrites) and also revise it into your own voice with proper citations. In STEM or data-heavy classes, have Al generate examples or pseudocode—then verify the math or code yourself.

Treat AI outputs as starting points, not finish lines: verify facts, click sources, and cite both original materials and the AI you used.

Avoid sharing sensitive student information or proprietary content, and follow your instructor's syllabus rules. If you're unsure whether Al is allowed on an assignment, ask first and document how you used it.

Al isn't replacing learning—it's becoming part of everyday academic life at Northern and campuses nationwide. Recent surveys suggest that a large majority of students have tried generative Al for coursework in the past year; what matters is *how* we use it: thoughtfully, ethically, and with academic integrity. Used **well**, these tools save time, spark ideas, and make complex material more approachable—for students, faculty, and staff alike.


